SCOTLAND'S GREAT CANAL.

Undertaking Will Save Hundreds of Miles and Cost \$50,000,000—Big Engineering Feat.

As was recently stated in a cable dispatch, the plans for the construction of a ship canal between the Firth of Forth, on the east of Scotland, across to the River Clyde, on the west, have been definitely arranged. The canal will cost \$50,000,000, but powerful support is expected from the British government. One of the great engineering features of the scheme will be the carrying of the canal near the Loch Lomond end. Frequent passing places will be made.

An indication of the saving in distance that would be effected by the canal, says an exchange, will be gained from the following figures: From the Clyde to ports on the east coast of Scotland, northeast of England, and northwest of Europe the distance saved would be from 529 miles to 228 miles. From the Firth of Forth to ports on the west coast of Scotland, northwest of England, Ireland, America and the Mediterranean the distance saved would be from 487 to 141 miles. From Tyne ports to the St. Lawrence river the distance saved would be 150 miles. From the west of Britain and northeast of Ireland to middle western ports of the continent the distance saved would be from 377 to 96 miles.

Engineer Was Offered Fifty Dollars a Minute for Every Minute Gained Over the Schedule.

There is a little story connected with the record-breaking run of the Lowe special over the Santa Fe, Chicago to Los Angeles, in less than 53 hours, which is not generally known.

It is related that Mr. Lowe offered the engineer who hauled the train from San Bernardino to Los Angeles—on the home stretch of 60 miles—the sum of \$50 a minute for every minute gained over the schedule. Engineer Warboy turned the wheels at a 50-second clip for each mile to Pasadena, but had to slow down in the suburbs of Los Angeles. He pulled into La Grande station, Los Angeles, just 62 minutes after leaving San Bernardino, gaining nine minutes on the whirlwind schedule and thereby earning \$450 extra pin money.

The Santa Fe passenger department will soon publish a pamphlet giving full details of the swift flight of the Lowe special, which in several instances exceeded 90 miles an hour. An average of nearly 43 miles an hour was maintained, in the face of having to cross four high ranges of the Rockies, and with little previous selection of engines or crews.

TOWER TRAP FOR GUNNERS.

Device Common in Europe, But Practically Unknown in This Country—Difficult Shots.

The equipment of the Pinehurst Gun club embraces an interesting feature in the shape of a tower trap. Such traps are quite common in Europe, but practically unknown in this country, says the New York Sun.

In the top of the tower are two target traps, one at the right and one at the left. The attendant is protected by a heavy plank partition which also hides the traps from view. The traps are pulled from the rear, in the usual manner.

Birds may be thrown in five ways, right, left, unknown, overhead and doubles. In all of these events, with the exception of the overhead birds, the shooter faces the tower at the usual distance. In the overhead shooting he stands back to the tower and directly underneath it. The sport furnished is novel as compared with the usual trap shooting.

The idea is to produce conditions such as those the sportsman experiences in wild waterfowl, pigeon or other shooting, or in shooting birds which fly from trees. Known angles to the right and left are not difficult and many gunners have a knack for killing overhead birds, but unknown angles puzzle the experts, and doubles, two birds shooting off in opposite directions and at the same time, call for a skill and quickness that few possess. But doubles are not impossible, and the shooting is wonderfully fascinating because of its difficulty.

Among the tropical fishes lately received at the aquarium from Bermuda were 20 or more little sergeant majors, two or three inches in length, which will flock together precisely like little chicks, and with the same confident fearlessness, says the New York Sun.

Let them be scattered through the water in all parts of their tank and let somebody tap gently low down on the outside of the glass and the whole bunch will come a-scurrying, as fast as their fins can drive them, all crowding in together as near those finger tips as they can get.

What draws them so, whether curiosity or hunger, or what, they all swarm at the call. And as little chicks will run, a moment later all together to another part of the field at the old hen's bidding, so will these little sergeant majors rush together again a moment later, at a second gentle tapping on the glass.
