RESTORATION OF OIL WELLS.

An Electric Heater Designed to Cause the Renewed Flow.

The general theory concerning the exhaustion of so many oil wells is that the oil, in passing through the stone, has clogged the porous stones with paraffine in such quantities that the further flow is stopped and the well ceases to produce. In many cases, says the Age of Steel, the supply in the earth has not given out, but only ceases to flow when the exit is stopped. The stone through which the oil passes is of a very porous nature, and, as the liquid is in a crude state, the thick matter becomes as drags, settling in the pores near the edges of the bottom of the well. Torpedoes have been used to destroy the stone at the bottom of the well, thus breaking up the clogged pores, but this method is expensive. A new method consists in lowering a specially-constructed electric heater into the well. The machine, which is eight feet long and resembles an iron cartridge, is placed in the bottom of the well and the current regulated so that the heater receives just enough to produce an enormous heat without melting the metal. By this peculiar construction of the carbon-packed chambers the intense heat is radiated about into the rock in all directions. Thus the paraffine and other refuse are softened and melted up so that they run, and when the well is started a fresh flow takes place, just as strong as it did when the well was just sunk.

A Woman's Cleverness.

A good story is told of the cleverness of a woman in a transaction with an insurance adjuster. The parlor curtains took fire, and before the blaze was extinguished the carpet was badly scorched. After looking over the damage the representative of the company said she was entitled to the value of a new carpet—\$100. "We will allow you that sum," continued the man, "and we will take your old carpet." "Why, what can you do with it?" "Oh, we'll sell it second-hand and get back \$10 or \$12 at least," was the careless reply. Intended to make the company's attitude as generous as possible. "In that case," promptly put in the owner of the carpet, "sell it to me. I'll give you \$12 for it." The adjuster could only comply, with the result that this quick-witted charlaine got a new parlor carpet with a handsome moquette floor covering as well for an upper room that needed it for \$12.

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Sunlight for Tuberculosis.

In several places in this country, especially in the west, experiments are being made with the hope of curing tuberculosis by concentrating the sun's rays upon the chests of the sufferers. The reflector is generally a concave mirror about three feet in diameter, sometimes overlaid with blue glass. All the light reflected from it is concentrated upon an area six inches in diameter. Thus an intense blue light is obtained, which, it is asserted, is sufficiently strong to pass entirely through the body, and even to reproduce a picture placed upon the back. The patient's chest is bared and he is seated in front of the reflector. The intense light is thrown upon his chest for two hours or more each day. It is asserted that the light penetrates the lungs and destroys the bacilli.—N. Y. Tribune.
