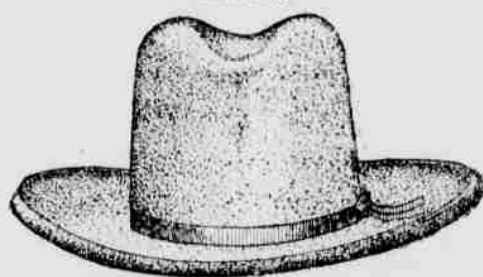
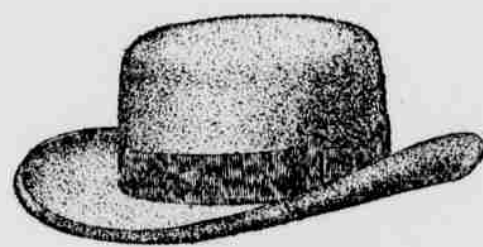

Dysentery Violent This Year.

Dysentery has proved a dread disease to parents this summer, many little ones having been taken away. Heppner is not alone in the affliction. Reports of death come from Portland, Hood River and Pendleton and all the towns on this coast have been visited. The disease is probably the same as what was formerly called bloody flux and is a form of cholera, being very persistent and hard to cure. A rigid course of dieting is

imperative, and all forms of fresh vegetables, including potatoes, must be excluded. Fresh milk also aggravates the disease and is often responsible for death to children. There have been no fatalities to older ones, but there is scarcely a person who has not had the disease. Physicians believe it is caused from a germ in the air, and that the present long hot summer has been especially favorable for its development. With cooler weather it will disappear and may not be so severe again for many years.

Two little victims have been numbered with the dead this week in Heppner. Frank Gentry lost a little boy two years old and Henry Cannon a little girl 8 months old.

Rev. J. M. Beard, D. D., stationed for many years at some of the leading appointments of the Southern Methodist Conference, in this city, and at one time editor of the New Orleans Christian Advocate, has been transferred by Bishop H. C. Morrison to the East Columbia Conference, and stationed at Walla Walla, Wash. His last appointment was Amite City, La. Dr. Beard has labored faithfully in Louisiana, and by his piety, sincerity, and deep interest in the welfare of others, has endeared himself to many. His brethren in the ministry, and the Methodist laymen generally, regret his removal to this far off land.—New Orleans Picayune.

Dr. Beard has been transferred to Heppner and will take the pastorate of the M. E. church, South in this city. He will commence the work in his new field of labor by holding regular services next Sunday. Rev. F. C. Adkins, the former pastor has resigned on account of his health.

Stimulating the Savings Habit.

J. S. Scott has been soliciting this week for the Bank of Heppner in the effort to get the people interested in the home savings bank system of saving money. Until very recent years banks have not entered the advertising field to any great extent, but now, in common with other lines of business, it has become quite the thing to take large blocks of newspaper space, and put solicitors out in the field and actually create, as well as promote business. No other departure in modern banking has been so valuable and helpful to the people as the savings deposits system, promoted and encouraged by the banks themselves. Thousands of people heretofore indifferent as to laying money by for a rainy day now have bank accounts, and their sense of independence and personal worth has been materially strengthened. As instances of how the plan works in places where banks have made an aggressive campaign to promote the saving habit among the people we quote:

The Union Savings Bank of Walla have out 500 of the little banks. The Exchange National of Spokane has 5000. The many thousands of dollars which have been deposited in these banks represents money that formerly practically went to waste.

The Illinois Trust Co's Bank of Chicago have out 100,000 of the little banks and the books show that in one year the people possessing them had deposited eight

millions of dollars, the great majority of whom had never before been in the habit of saving a single cent.

The Bank of First Smith has out 800 of the banks and in the year past shows the savings of the people to have been \$50,000.
