

Dr. Tufts' Lecture.

On last Sunday, Rev. Dr. Tufts state lecturer of the Oregon Anti-Saloon League, delivered addresses in the M. E. church in the forenoon and at the Christian church in the evening. Dr. Tufts who is a veteran temperance worker and speaker, reviewed the temperance situation in this state thoroughly, declaring that here was at the present both urgent need and opportunity for reform. The whiskey traffic in the state was, he declared doing immense harm and was perhaps never so well organized for defense as at present and hence the necessity for both union and agitation upon the part of the temperance workers. In carrying on this work he suggested that the women could give valuable aid and he appealed to them to render help especially in securing votes on election day. He paid his respects to Heppner leaders and argued that prohibition was righteous if for no other reason on the ground of corporate self preservation. Some of his periods describing the effects of strong drink and narration of incidents setting forth its destructiveness to both life and morals were truly thrilling and awakened responses in the large audience. An organized effort will be made he declared to carry the state for prohibition in the November election and he urged all good citizens of all faiths and parties to unite for this purpose. He stated that the triumph of local option in the late election was proof enough that this measure was more than popular with the voting masses. At the close of the evening lecture a public collection was taken to aid in this work amounting to \$40.

Wool in Demand.

Boston, Sept. 21.—The Commercial Bulletin said yesterday: "The demand for wool is as acute as ever. Large manufacturers continue their operations, having secured good sized blocks of Territory and medium fleeces during the week. There has been considerable speculation in scoured wools. Close to 5000 bags of the same changed hands at prices showing a liberal advance from those of a few weeks ago. The market for all grades is very firm. Fractional advances in grossy Territories are reported and the tendency of all quotations is steadily upward. Stocks and selections are getting poorer and deliveries this week are over 2,500,000 pounds in excess of the receipts. The shipments of wool from Boston to date from December 31, 1903, according to the same authority, are 160,198,868 pounds, against 165,936,680 pounds at the same time last year. The receipts to date are 256,365,527 pounds, against 226,846,824 pounds for the same period last year."
