Peary at the Pole in 1905.

Peary is going after the North Pole once more. He will start in the summer of 1905. If Peary does not hurry some one may beat him in the race. The North Pole is no longer far away.

An Italian duke holds the record of farthest north. He reached the latitude of 86 degrees 33 minutes. In 1895 Nansen reached 86 degrees 14 minutes. The Duke of Arbruzzi was only about 207 miles from the pole. If the North Pole were New York, the Duke of Arbruzzi got as close as Washington City. Science in two years has given Peary a great advantage. If Peary goes as far north as Arbruzzi in a ship he will be in a splendid position for a 200-mile dash. He can take with him two auto mobiles. If the ice is smooth he can make a dash in one of these machines, followed by another bearing food and fuel. The trip over the 200 miles and back should not take longer than four days.

Science this year will give Peary another great vehicle of travel. The flying machine has already covered a distance of 100 miles. It is being so rapidly perfected that before next summer it should be equal to a journey of 300 or 400 miles. Peary may utilize the airship when he reaches the limit of the journey of the seaship.

Science will again help Peary and will keep him from getting lost. It will permit him at all times to talk with the crew on his ship. A wireless telegraph outfit can be installed on his ship. Another outfit can be taken with the automobile party or with the airship crew. This will enable Peary to keep in touch with his base.

What with the automobile, the airship and the wireless telegraph. Peary should cover the 200 or 300 miles overland or over frozen ice with little trouble.

Thus the progress of invention will open to man the secret of the frozen zone.—New York American.

Senator Hoar is Dead.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 30.—So peacefully, so calmly, so stealthily did the spirit of Senator George F. Hoar pass into the beyond this morning at 1:35, that had not the watchers been patiently listening to the fluttering heart throbs it would have been difficult to say when life ended and death came.

He had been unconscious since yesterday morning and the end came without suffering. The family knew the great senator could not linger long and had watched at the bedside for the spark of life to fade.

So weak had he become through his months of suffering, and so feeble was the pulse beat, that for hours before death really came, it could scarcely be said whether he still lingered or not.

At 1:35 the family physician who had not left the bedside for 21 hours, announced that death had come.

Rushing Work on Condon Road.

The Pacific Construction Company, in charge of the grading of the Arlington-Condon line of the O. R. & N. company, now has about four miles of the new road graded, and is pushing the work with a force of nearly 1000 men.

The Pacific Construction Company's contract covers the grading and bridging for the new line from Arlington to Condon, 47 miles. The contract requires that the work shall be done December 31. The ties and rails will be laid by the O. R. & N. Co., and the line is expected to be in operation early next spring. Much of the route is level, and the work of construction is very rapid. There is not a cut nor a grade on the line that requires steam-shovel work.

With Hammer and Hatchet.

Wichita, Kan., Sept. 30.—Mrs. Carrie E. Nation, Mrs. Lucy Wilhelm, Mrs. Lyda Mountz and Mrs. Myra McHenry broke two large plate glass windows in the Mahan Wholesale Supply Company's warehouse at 5 o'clock this afternoon. They were arrested and are now in jail. One man offered to bail them out and when his offer was rejected became abusive and was locked in an adjoining cell. The women knelt in a circle and have been engaged in prayer most of the time since their arrest. Mrs. Nation's hatchet was taken from her and Mrs. McHenry's hammer and both demand the return of the weapons which they claim they cherish.

Gold in United States.

Washington, Oct. 1.—George E. Roberts, director of the mint completed the calculation of the production of gold and silver in the United States and the world for 1903. The total gold output of the United States is \$73,600,000, silver, \$29,300,000. Of this Oregon produced \$1,300,000 gold, \$64,000 silver; Washington, \$250,000 gold, and \$160,000 silver. The world's output \$325,500,000 gold, \$92,000,000 silver.

Last Rites for Hoar.

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 3.—The funeral services of the late United States Senator Geo. F. Hoar were held here today. The day was beautifully clear and cool and the residents of the city attended probably in greater numbers than had ever before assembled. Thousands lined the street through which the procession passed. All business was suspended.

Services were held in the little church of Unity, which the Senator attended. In accordance with his wishes these were of a most unceremonious nature. Dr. Rush R. Scippen, of Brooklyn, spoke briefly of his personal acquaintance with the Senator, and Edward Everett Hale spoke at great length, after reading a psalm and offering a brief prayer. Tomorrow the body will be taken to Concord for interment.
