Harry Rogers, the well known Butter creek stockman, passed through the city Monday with a drove of 330 head of fat cattle. The cattle were picked up in small bunches in the Lone Rock and Fossil country. Mr. Rogers will feed the animals on alfalfa for beef at his Butter Creek ranch.

A Shakespearian club was organized in this city last Friday evening. The meeting was held at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Warnock. Miss Caftan was elected president, and Clyde Brock, secretary. There will be regular meetings and a systematic course of study will be taken up.

New Bank for Lexington.

Lexington is to have a bank. After looking the field over thoroughly Cashier Wharton has decided that our nearest neighbor is of sufficient commercial importance to entitle it to a banking institution of its own, and Tuesday morning he left for Portland to purchase the necessary equipment. This is expected to be in place by Saturday night, so that it is a matter of but a very few days till Lexington's needs in this regard will be provided.

This will make the fourth in the chain of banks organized by the Car Investment Co. The first is the Union Savings Bank of Walla Walla. The second was the Bank of Heppner. The third is the Douglas County Bank of Waterville, purchased last week for \$100,000. The deposits of this bank amount to \$270,000, cash on hand and in bank \$139,000.

Almost a Blaze.
