men object to such laws? Forty counties in the state of Kansas do not have a pauper. The jails in thirty-seven counties are without a single inmate. Prohibition in Kansas prohibits more than 95 per cent." That is not quite a failure and would be a great improvement for Morrow county. "There are voters in Kansas who have never seen a saloon in the county in which they were born and now live and in whose minds liquor selling is classed in the same category as stealing or any similar crime," writes a Kansas gentleman. As the law is enforced in Kansas it amounts to local option, for there are probably thirty towns in the state where local sentiment governs the people rather than the law. There are 734 newspapers in Kansas whose columns are not stultified with liquor advertisements. How many in Oregon?

A writer from Kansas City said last year: "But today the people of Kansas are better clothed, fed, live in better houses, have better laws, roads and state institutions, with \$52,000,000 deposits in the banks of the state."

One other item regarding Kansas. The town of Hutchinson has a population of 10,000 or more. Illegal saloons, or "joints," were tolerated for several years. Recently a reform mayor was elected who has enforced the law. Results: The floating debt has been reduced, the street fund has changed from a deficit of \$8,000 to a surplus of \$400, the general fund from \$15,000 deficit to \$5000 deficit. Before the election of this reform mayor about two years ago the city depended upon its "joint" money and ran behind, now not a cent of "joint" money is collected and the city has a surplus. Does prohibition pay even in Kansas? Upon the criminal docket there is scarcely anything. The cost now for Hutchinson's criminals is about \$500 for two years against from \$5000 to \$10,000 for the same length of time while "joints" were tolerated. Does prohibition succeed in Hutchinson?

Now as to Maine. Before she had prohibition she had no money in her saving banks. Now under prohibition she has \$66,000,000. Illinois with her whiskey and several times more population has \$2,000,000 less deposits. Ohio with sixteen times the population has her whiskey and \$22,000,000 less deposits. In other words, Maine has in her savings banks \$92.22 for each inhabitant, while Illinois has only \$13.43 per capita and Ohio only \$10.71. Now as to pauperism compare Maine with the same whiskey states. Since the prohibition law was passed pauperism decreased in Maine 245 per cent. In Illinois pauperism increased during the same time 176 per cent. In Ohio pauperism increased 138 per cent. As to crime any one can easily guess, but in 1898 there were only 13 prisoners for 10,000 white people.

Here is another comparison for you. Maine, a prohibition state, has 257 convicts per 1,000,000 inhabitants, while California, our neighbor, with her wine and other liquors has 1698 convicts per 1,000,000 population. Is prohibition a failure in Maine? Whiskey is run in "under the disguise of merchandise." And sometimes the deputy sheriff does his duty in running in upon some such violation of the law as for instance in Bangor, Maine, in August 34 out of 39 of the questionable resorts were raided, that "merchandise" seized, and the proprietors arrested. Each violation was fined \$100 and costs and confined to jail for 60 days. "Blind pigs" are sometimes caught. They are easily caught when people want to catch them.

It is stated that the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia has closed about nine hundred saloons during the past year. This is a fine record.
