Army Mule Doomed.

The army mule, that long-eared mongrel that has ever been identified as chief among the non-combatants of Uncle Sam's warriors, is soon to be a thing of the past in the department of the Columbia. In days gone by in every department of the army where heavy draft work was required, mules were used. They hauled the quartermasters' wagons, the commissary stores, the fire apparatus at the posts, the sprinkling wagons and even the ambulances. Horses were used simply as mounts and in the field artillery and cavalry branches.

It is said that to provide the department with draft horses and roadster will cost the government about \$150 a span. The mules now in use will be sold. The change will take place within the next four weeks.
