CATTLE MOVEMENTS.

Transactions For Week Show Improved Market.

Cattle movements have been quite active during the week.

R. N. Stanfield, the Batter creek feeder, received 500 head of fat feeders this week. The cattle came from the Beaver creek country in Crook county. They were brought in by Messrs. Smith, Laughlin and Cowell. Three car loads of cows were shipped to Portland and the balance will be fed on Butter creek. On the 22nd of this month another lot of 200 head will be received here.

Another shipment of three car loads of fat cattle will be shipped to Portland this week.

J. R. Duncan, of Waitsburg, Wash., is here looking after the purchase of stock cattle. Stock cattle are now plentiful. Owing to the good grass this season, stock have come off the summer ranges in fine condition.

R. N. Stanfield will feed about 1300 head of steers on his Batter creek ranch this winter. Mr. Stanfield has 3500 tons of alfalfa.

Tuesday C. McAlister shipped to Big Timber, Montana, 3500 lambs. The sheep were purchased from Tunis Swick, Walt Fie'ds and Smith Bros., in the Monument country in Grant county. The price paid was \$2.50 per head.

The Hardman district has produced the best quality of wheat grown in Morrow county this season. The Blackhorse country has produced the heaviest wheat. One load of spring wheat from the Blackhorse country averaged 150 pounds to the sack.

BIG REPUBLICAN MEETING.

Speaking and Big Parade On November 5.

There will be a big Republican meeting in Heppner on Saturday evening, November 5. All of the necessary arrangements have been made; however, the name of the speaker has not yet been definitely learned. Nothing will be left undone to make this meeting a success. There will be plenty of entertainment.

Attorney S. E. Notson, of Lexington, was in Heppner Tuesday. Mr. Notson stated to the Gazette that Lexington would handle more wheat this season than ever before. About 140,000 bushels have already been received by the warehouses, and it is estimated that this much more is still in the farmers' fields. Nearly all of the wheat in the warehouses has been sold. Some of the Lexington wheat has been shipped direct to the Atlantic seaboard by Kerr, Gifford & Co. Three cars of 80,000 pounds capacity each were loaded in bulk and one of 30,000 have already been shipped with two more yet to go. These cars are all billed for Ballinorn, Maryland. Most of this wheat was grown by Ralph Binge and the grain was of high grade.

A large amount of wheat is now being hauled to the Heppner mill and the different warehouses. Owing to a scarcity of cars to transport the great crop of the West, the market has shown a slight decline, however, prices remain fairly firm at 70c per bushel for club and 75c for blue stein. Rye is quoted at from \$1.90 to \$2 per hundred. Barley prices are a little off, only 80c per hundred being the best offers. Growers generally are holding for an advance and do not care to sell for less than \$1 per hundred.

Hynd Bros. this week purchased 1000 yearling ewes from A. R. Cox, at \$2.75 per head. This is the top price so far this season. Owing to the large hay crop, the local demand is very good, in fact it has stimulated prices above the Eastern demand.

Heppner is now receiving wheat from the Lexington district. Lexington warehouses are so crowded that the wheat can not be handled there and the grain is being hauled here. Some of this wheat will be purchased by Lexington buyers and shipped from here.

A meeting of the Morrow County Roosevelt club was held at Robert's hall Monday evening. The meeting was called for the purpose of making the necessary arrangements for the big Republican rally on Saturday evening, November 5. Committees for the various arrangements were appointed.
