

NEGROES DRIVEN OUT.

Masked Men Force Them to Leave an Idaho Town.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 13.—News has reached this city of action on the part of certain citizens of Mountain Home that has freed that place of its colored population. According to this information, a delegation of about 25 masked men three weeks ago visited the house of T. J. Bellamy, colored, and notified the family that they must leave town. It appears that the objection to the presence of the colored family there lay in the fact that the Bellamy children attended the public schools. The family left very shortly after the visit of the masked men, going to Oregon.

George Costiff, an aged negro, who had lived in the section for a number of years, was, it is understood, also requested to leave. He and the members of the Bellamy family were, it seems, the only negroes in the place. Objection to Costiff apparently was not deep-rooted, as he had no children. However, he was impressed with the fact that his presence was distasteful to certain people in Mountain Home, and that he had better leave. He was given ample time, and only departed last Tuesday. It is understood he was assisted financially by members of the committee. He went to some point in the East.

Bellamy was formerly a cook on a dining-car, having come from Lawrence, Kan., to Mountain Home. Both he and his wife were said to be very industrious. She assisted him by washing for well-known families in Mountain Home. Bellamy, it is said, has written Governor Morrison concerning the affair at Mountain Home, and it is said he has also sent a letter to President Roosevelt.

LARGE CATTLE DELIVERY.

Twenty-five Hundred Head Brought to Pendleton.

During the past three days there have been driven into Pendleton over 2,000 head of cattle. The cattle were purchased of stockmen in the John Day country, the northern part of Grant county and Camas Prairie.

About half of this number will be held in this county as feeders and put on the market in early spring. The fat cattle and steers are being shipped to Portland and the Sound markets. J. C. Lonergan, of the Frey-Bruhn company, has purchased the largest portion of the fat stock and is now shipping the cattle to Seattle. Five carloads were shipped via the W. & C. R. and Northern Pacific on Tuesday night to Seattle and another large shipment will be made today or tomorrow. The prices for good beef cattle have increased a small margin since the big sales of a month ago, but stockmen are of the opinion that quotations are not up where they should be, considering the brisk demand for fat stock.

Fourteen hundred of the number were bought from cattlemen in the John Day country and the remainder from stockmen in Camas Prairie and the northern part of Grant county. Today 500 more head are expected to arrive from Lizee. A portion of these will be shipped to the Frey-Bruhn company at Seattle as soon as cars can be secured for their transportation.

The large number of feeders have been purchased by various stockmen in this county. The stock will be fattened during the winter for early spring delivery. Among the Umatilla county stockmen who have purchased feeders are Stanfield Bros., A. B. Thomson, Barney Shendan, Henry Rogers and Julius Gurdarian.

Two hundred fat steers were purchased by James Kidwell Monday for the Walla Walla Dressed Meat company and have been already shipped to the slaughter yards.

The cattle, numbering over 2,500, were purchased of the following stockmen: H. H. Towbridge, John Laack, Walter Brown, David McGill, Isaac Mills, C. W. Officer, E. S. Harrison, Carnes & Haines.—Pendleton Tribune.
