MAY MAGNIFY TIME.

The Stroboscope Enables the Careful Examination of Anything in Motion.

Just as there are things so small that the naked eye cannot see them, and we use a microscope, so there are other things that move so quickly that we cannot see them. It is to enable us to magnify the time taken by very rapid motions that the stroboscope has been invented—an instrument described before the institution of electrical engineers, London, by the eminent French electrician, M. Hospitalier, president of the Societe Internationale des Electriciens, reports a London paper.

Take, for instance, the case of an engine or machine moving at great speed. Its parts appear a mere blur to the spectator, yet an important improvement may depend on the possibility of realizing exactly how a certain part of the motion at full speed takes place. The stroboscope is an instrument which enables this to be done. A movement that really takes place in a hundredth or a thousandth of a second may be seen drawn out to a quarter of a minute or more. The time of the movement is magnified so as to enable it to be watched and examined at leisure. The means that produce this wonderful result are ludicrously simple when you know them. By means of an electric spark fired at rapid recurring periods, or a revolving disk with slits passed before a lantern, the moving object is illuminated in a succession of flashes. If the flashes coincide exactly with the period of the machine's revolution they will show it always in one position, and to the observer it will seem at rest.

By slightly retarding the flashes, so that they lag behind their time, the machine under observation will seem to move slowly, because at each revolution it is shown at a slightly later stage. Thus a movement too rapid for direct observation may be analyzed and watched slowly, the strains or vibrations at every point being clearly noted. Thus you may watch the formation of the stitch in a sewing machine, the exact way in which a petrol motor works, and a thousand other machine movements where it is important to see slowly what goes on with lightning speed. The great glare of the arc lamp is not a continuous light, but the see-saw of an alternating current, so fast that the eye cannot catch the rise and fall of the illumination. The stroboscope will throw the image of the arc and screen so that the rise and fall appears quite slow, and the effects of different kinds of carbons, different frequencies and different methods of regulation can be judged. The stroboscope principle has many applications, and M. Hospitalier explained the allied instruments, the "ondographe" (wave recorder) and "pulsance graphie" (power recorder), by which electric currents of immense rapidity may be studied and the exact nature of their periodic action determined and recorded.

AUSTRIA'S STATE SECRETS.

They Are Placed for Security in Iron Rooms of House Built Expressly for Them.

The Austrian imperial archives have been lately conveyed from the Hofburg to the great house built for them adjoining the foreign office. They will later on be opened for public inspection, from the most ancient documents down to those of 1849, says the London Telegraph. The rooms containing the secret archives are of ironwork, each story being completely separated from the next one, so that neither fire nor water can penetrate. Hose supplying abundance of water is fixed in every direction, the windows can neither be melted by fire nor destroyed by blows and the ornamental ironwork before each window can be unlocked in case of emergency.

It is remembered when Napoleon Bonaparte invaded Austria and established himself at Schonbrunn with what terrible haste the secret archives were carried off to Buda-Pesth to the Ofen stronghold, these being the first things secured when all else was left. Among the iron cases stands a plain wooden box which will not be opened for 50 years.

It contains the letters and papers of the late Crown Prince Rudolph hurriedly collected at Mayerling on the day of the disaster and placed in a box bought in the adjoining village.

Quinces with Apples.

If possible use pippin apples or a variety that is firm and sweet. Take equal quantities of apples and quinces. Pare and cut the apples and quinces in round slices; remove the cores with a small round cutter. Stew the quinces in just enough water to cover them until they are tender; then remove them and put the apples in the same water and cook them tender without breaking them. Place the fruit in separate dishes and cover them with a hot syrup made of one part sugar and two and a half parts water; cover and let them stand over night. In the morning reheat the fruit and syrup and place in alternate layers in glass jars and seal at once.—Washington Star.
