There is living in Downingtown, Pa., a former soldier in the Russian army who can testify to the fact that there is a secret rule in the czar's army to kill all the wounded, says a dispatch to the Chicago Chronicle. His name is J. M. Schulman; he conducts a flourishing clothing store; and previously to coming to this country served two months in the Russian army as a conscript. He says:

"There is a secret rule in the Russian army to kill all the wounded. It is commented to all officers and is tacitly understood among the soldiers. The Russians argue that the maintenance of hospitals is too expensive—more so than to kill off the wounded."

"I am in a position to say with the utmost positiveness that such a rule exists in the Russian army and that it applies at least to the privates, and possibly to the officers."

PARDONED BY THE MIKADO.

Knowledge of English Gave Viscount Hayashi, Japanese Minister to Britain, Lease of Life.

Viscount Hayashi, the Japanese minister to Great Britain, spent several years at the University of London and returned to his own country in time to take part in the rebellion of the reactionists, between 1865 and 1868.

The revolt was put down and the revolutionists, Hayashi and the rest, were turned over to the "lord high executioner," who put them in iron cages until he got ready to cut their heads off.

About that time the mikado happened to be in great need of a man who could interpret English for him, and somebody thought of Hayashi. The condemned rebel was taken from his cage and performed the task so well the mikado pardoned him and made him imperial interpreter. At that time there were only five or six Japanese who could speak English.

Driving Concrete Piles.

In the suburbs of Berlin recently concrete has been employed in place of wood in making piles to be driven into the ground for foundations to buildings. These singular piles, varying from 17 to 26 feet in length, are triangular in cross section, and consist of Portland cement mixed with river ballast, the composition being stayed with an armature comprising, for each pile, three quarter-inch iron rods tied together at regular intervals, the rods being set into the concrete. The heads of the piles are guarded by buffers, and, thus protected, they can be hammered into the ground like wooden beams with a pile driver.

THREE ZONES IN ONE HOUR

Two Known Regions Where That Many Temperatures Come Very Close Together.

Only two places exist on this globe where one can pass through three zones of temperature—the tropical, subtropical and temperate—within an hour's time. Hawaii is one of these places and Darjeeling, in northeastern India, is another. In both these places, says a geographical journal, the trick is done by climbing up the high mountains. In Hawaii the traveler starts with the warm breath of the Pacific fanning him amid the smell of palm trees. He passes by great clusters of tropical fruit and as he mounts the trees change, until he is in the kind of scenery that may be found in the southern United States. Still he climbs, and soon he notices that it is much cooler and that the character of the scene has changed to one that reminds him of the temperate zone, with fields in which potatoes and other northern vegetables are growing.

In Darjeeling the change is still more wonderful. The entrance to the tableland on which the little mountain city stands is through a dark, somber tropical pass, full of mighty palms and hung with orchids and other jungle growth. After awhile the trees change from palms to the wonderful tree ferns. These alternate with banana trees, until, after some more climbing, forests are reached of magnolias and similar trees. Through these magnolias the way leads ever up, and all at once, over an open pass, there come into view immense thickets of Himalayan rhododendrons and the evergreen of firs and cedars, and beyond stand the white, grim, snowclad, frozen mountain peaks like arctic icebergs on land. In less than two hours a traveler can ascend from orchids through jungles to tea plantations and thence to a climate of northern roses and violets.

Morrow County, Oregon.

Morrow County is a new country, and like all other new countries, is awaiting development. Located in the Columbia river valley, and skirted on the South with a spur of the Blue mountains, within the boundaries of Morrow county is a territory 75 miles in length by 35 miles in width, and containing 1,313,280 acres of land. Formerly stockraising was the principal industry, but latterly the fertility of the land is bringing agriculture to the front. Immense wheat crops are grown with little cultivation, the soil being mixed with a volcanic ash which is very rich in wheat-producing qualities. The 1904 crop will aggregate 1,400,000 bushels, much of it from virgin soil.

Morrow county has thousands of head of sheep, horses and cattle. The wool production for 1904 was 2,500,000 pounds. Alfalfa and fruit growing are profitable industries, rapidly growing in importance. The county has also a great coal field, soon to be developed.
