Roosevelt's plurality of almost 43,000 in Oregon, is far more than was ever estimated by even his most enthusiastic admirers. It was a great victory for progress and prosperity.

A Gazette representative visited Ione last Saturday. We are pleased to note the prosperity of the bustling little city. Ione is a great primary wheat market. The wheat hauled direct to Ione will be very close to 500,000 bushels, while at Jordan Siding, only three miles away, 200,000 bushels will be handled. The wheat from Jordan Siding is all billed out of Ione, and the prosperous little town will practically handle this year 700,000 bushels. This cannot help but make Ione a good town.

Morrow county has a great future as a wheat country. While this year's crop was immense, the time is not far distant when much more wheat will be grown every season. Farmers are now beginning to realize the necessity of better cultivation and better farming will mean a much greater yield. There is still a large territory of good wheat land in this county that has never been plowed. Most of the wheat land that is now being used for grazing purposes is in the foot hills tributary to Heppner. Some day Heppner will be an important wheat center.

The many old friends of Senator Morrow were pleased to meet him on the streets of Heppner, Wednesday. Not only glad to see him personally, but glad of the privilege offered for congratulation over his recent promotion with the O. R. & N. Co. Mr. Morrow for the past year has been representing the company as their Tax Commissioner, but now, through an order issued by the general manager a few days since, he assumes the duties of both tax and right of way agent of the O. R. & N. system, as well as the S. P. and O. & C. line in Oregon.

Getting After The Trusts.

The story in the New York World that President Roosevelt has ordered the department of commerce and labor to ascertain whether or not the Standard Oil company is an illegal combination need occasion no surprise. The province of the department is to examine into the operations of all large corporations and ascertain if they are complying with the law. Inasmuch as it is a new department and time has been required to get it into good running order, there has been some delay in taking up many of the tasks assigned to it. But such an investigation as that outlined by the World was contemplated when the department was created, not only as to the Standard Oil, but also as to all other concerns dealing in commodities in general use. The World report that the president has determined that the Standard Oil shall be broken is manifestly exaggerated. What he does intend, probably, is that the department shall prosecute its inquiries and bring to account all corporations that have gone beyond their legal rights. That is

It is for the department, and not for the president, to find out the facts, and he is not the kind of a man to make extreme utterances until he has the facts before him. When he has a report of the operations of the Standard Oil he may act, and his action will be for the interest of the general public.—Spokesman Review.
