MONEY NOT LACKING.

\$4,230,659 Available for Irrigation in Oregon.

Oregon has contributed nearly \$1,000,000 more to the National reclamation fund than has any other state. The fund on June 30 was \$23,012,836, of which \$4,230,659 was derived from public land sales in Oregon and \$2,735,262 in Washington. The reclamation act of Congress directs the Secretary of the Interior to expend at least the major portion of each state's contribution within that state so far as may be practicable.

A large sum of money is therefore ready for expenditure in Oregon on irrigation works. The reclamation service has had projects in mind in several different parts of Oregon, but has encountered obstacles in each. The Deschutes country is a favorable area, but the reclamation service has stayed out because private enterprise is at work there under the Carey act. The project on Butter Creek, Umatilla County, was not pursued because conditions were not found adapted to the storing of water in reservoirs. The project in Harney County has been deferred because F. H. Newell, chief of the reclamation service, is convinced that not enough water is available. The project in Malheur County seems to be held up by a wagon-road company which holds alternate sections of land in the irrigable area.

Klamath County presents one of the best irrigable areas in the whole West, and the reclamation service is now working on plans there. But the project in that county contemplates the use of lake waters, to the detriment of navigation and the injury of several private irrigation companies, consequently legal problems are presented which are likely to retard the Government's plans.

F. H. Newell and other members of the reclamation service were in Klamath County last week, examining the situation. At his suggestion a waterusers' association was formed, to clear the way for the Government's securing lands for the project.

Gloom in Germany.

Berlin, Dec. 5.—Profound gloom has followed the official revelations in the Reichstag on Saturday as to the dismal state of the imperial finances. The discussion of the budget with its accompanying deficit of 293,000,000 marks (\$69,734,000) began at noon today amid intense excitement, due to the bitter criticism all parties are preparing to heap on the government's stewardship. The Secretary of the Treasury's warning that the future of the country is being endangered by the continuance of the practice of covering deficits by borrowed money contains the disquieting indication that the government is about to levy fresh taxes to meet the extraordinary expenses of suppressing the insurrection in South Africa, and other requirements for which the revenue is inadequate.

Germany is so straitened for lack of money that it is effectually prevented from constructive action of any kind. The Kaiser cannot build new warships, make any substantial increase in the army, nor even carry out needed public

works such as the erection of government buildings in Berlin.

Already the rebellion in German Southwest Africa has cost 80,000,000 marks (\$21,000,000) more than estimated at the outbreak of the affair, and unless it be suppressed by June, 1905, will cost 200,000,000 marks (\$47,000,000). The seriousness of the present state of affairs is causing many responsible Germans to consider whether the Fatherland is economically able to bear the strain of the ambitious naval, military and colonial policy it has followed during the past ten years.

Centennial Notes.

The Bridge of Nations at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, which connects the Government Peninsula and the mainland is more than two thousand feet long.

Roosevelt avenue, which skirts the shore of the Government Peninsula at the Lewis and Clark Centennial, is the only road named after a living American.

The shady driveways in Centennial Park at the Lewis and Clark Fair have been named after western states, being known as Idaho Avenue, Wyoming Avenue, and Montana Avenue.

Three water towers, each sixty feet high, will supply water for emergency at the Lewis and Clark Centennial. The towers will be covered with vines which will completely conceal the woodwork.

The National Association of State Dairy and Food Departments, consisting of about 300 delegates, will hold its next convention at Portland in June, during the Lewis and Clark Centennial.

The bronze statue of Sacajawea, the Indian heroine, will be located in the center of Columbia Court, the central plaza of the Exposition. The statue will face the west.

Work on the Government Building at the Lewis and Clark Centennial is progressing rapidly, and the building will be completed by April 1st.
