F. W. Atkinson in World's Work.

An experience of three years in the Philippines has brought me to the conclusion that the Filipinos are incapable of self-government. They are managed by a few ambitious leaders. They have not yet cultivated a sense of fair play and tolerance for those who differ in opinion, and yet, although the gift of self-government in full measure was not possible, the United States bestows it to a degree by granting practical autonomy in provincial and municipal affairs. There are some 600 towns in which natives have, in the main, the same control over their local affairs as is enjoyed by the residents of towns of corresponding size in the United States. But a concentration of governmental powers has been found.

Very few of them, however, show executive ability, and some of them betray obstinate inefficiency and inactivity. The tendency everywhere in the East is in the direction of one-man power; and, too often in the Philippines, the Mayor, or Provincial Governor, dominates everything, so far as can be. He is very ready with promises; but, as some one has said, "the Filipino never says 'no,' but never does 'yes.'" When asked for information, he studies you, and is inclined to give you the answer he thinks you want. Indirectness is a trait, and the giving of gifts by subjects to those in authority, a custom common in the Philippines. From instinct, the Filipino agrees with the boodler's opinion that there is no use in holding an office unless it can be turned to profit. It is hard for Filipinos to understand that the giving of presents to government officials is not right; it is very difficult for them to believe that a man, because he happens to be white, has any scruples against it. They look with a measure of contempt upon a man who refuses.

The question of "How old was Ann?" has given place in the East to "How bad was Nan?" says the Chronicle of The Dalles.

Sued By Dressmakers.

New York, Dec. 8.—Mrs. Katherine Clemmons-Gould's husband, Howard Gould, is defendant in a suit in the supreme court brought by a dressmaking firm to recover \$5760 for dresses which they say Mrs. Gould ordered and agreed to pay for.

There are 16 items in the bill. Among the charges are \$160 for a bluen cloth jacket and skirt; \$50 for a black taffeta and velvet dress; \$420 for a "yellow radium" silk embroidered dress, and \$135 for a black spangled and jet dress.

According to the dressmakers, Mrs. Gould ordered 16 gowns on October 4, and 11 of them were delivered to her at St. Regis, November 11. Within a few days she ordered work stopped on the other five, and then, being unable to collect, the modistes sued.

Mr. Gould's attorney will prepare an answer setting forth Mrs. Gould's objections to the gowns and the bill.

Pour Sheep Into Malheur.

Vale, Or., Dec. 8.—During the past two weeks about 20,000 head of high-grade sheep, belonging to A. G. Butterfield, of Weiser, Idaho, have been passing through Vale in separate bands en route to the "desert" in the Owyhee regions, where they will be fed during the approaching winter. Several other prominent Idaho sheepraisers and several from Heppner have decided to move their bands into Malheur, where they have purchased a sufficient amount of alfalfa hay from the Malheur ranchers to last them until late in the spring.

Abe Mose, a prominent horsebuyer of Stockton, Cal., has been in this county for several weeks, buying heavy-weight horses to be shipped to the California markets. Mr. Mose was formerly a Harney County stockman. He is paying \$125 a head. Several Eastern horsebuyers are in the vicinity buying range horses to supply the Eastern markets.

Morrow County, Oregon.

Morrow County is a new country, and like all other new countries, is awaiting development.

Located in the Columbia river valley, and skirted on the South with a spur of the Blue mountains, within the boundaries of Morrow county is a territory 75 miles in length by 35 miles in width, and containing 1,313,280 acres of land. Formerly stockraising was the principal industry, but latterly the fertility of the land is bringing agriculture to the front. Immense wheat crops are grown, with little cultivation, the soil being mixed with a volcanic ash which is very rich in wheat-producing qualities. The 1904 crop will aggregate 1,400,000 bushels, much of it from virgin soil.

Morrow county has thousands of head of sheep, horses and cattle. The wool production for 1904 was 2,500,000 pounds. Alfalfa and fruit growing are profitable industries, rapidly growing in importance. The county has also a great coal field, soon to be developed.
