Philippine Bill Passed.

Washington, Dec. 16.—The Senate today, by a vote of 44 to 23, passed the Philippine civil government bill. The final vote was preceded by the presentation of many amendments, and a general discussion of them, as well as of the provisions of the bill. The discussion was confined quite generally to the merits of the measure. On some of the amendments suggested by Democratic Senators several Western Republicans voted in the affirmative, but McCumber (N. D.) was the only Republican who voted with the Democrats against the final passage of the bill.

The most notable change made during the day was the lowering of the rate of interest on railroad bonds to be guaranteed by the Philippine Government from 5 to 4 per cent.

The bill, as passed, exempts from taxation all bonds issued by the Philippine and Porto Rican Governments; authorizes municipalities in the Philippines to incur a bonded indebtedness amounting to 5 per cent of the assessed valuation of their property, at 5 per cent interest; authorizes the Philippine Government to incur a bonded indebtedness of \$5,000,000 for improvements at 4½ per cent interest; authorizes the Philippine Government to guarantee the payment of interest on railroad bonds at the rate of 4 per cent per annum; provides for the administration of the immigration laws by the Philippine authorities; establishes a system for the location and patenting of mineral, coal and saline lands; fixes the metric system for the islands and gives the civil governor the title of Governor-General.

The O. R. & N. has announced an eastern rate on flour from points north of Winona, Wash., to points between the Missouri river and Chicago, of 52½ cents per hundred. It is the same as the wheat rate to those places and replaces a rate of 53 cents.

SEEKS A BRIDE.

Alice Roosevelt May be Future Queen.

Paris, Dec. 17.—Many members of the Scandinavian colony in this city seem to take seriously the dispatches from Stockholm reporting that an arrangement has been made by the Crown Prince Gustavus Adolphus to meet Alice Roosevelt at the house of Whitelaw Reid in London with the object of taking the first step toward the offer of his heart and hand. It is well known that Gustavus has been looking for a bride in the courts of Europe during the past year, but unsuccessfully. It is also known that no more democratic people and King exist than the Swedes and Oscar.

That the American people might not like such a union, or that the father of the prospective bride might not consent, does not enter the heads of social lights or the Swedish colony here. One of the Swedish leaders said today:

"I know no more about the subject than that it has been discussed seriously in court circles in Stockholm, perhaps more as a theory than as an actual intention. The royal family and the King entertain a warm admiration for President Roosevelt and the American people. Certainly King Oscar would not object if the project should succeed."

Prince Gustavus was found this evening.

"Yes," he said agreeably, "I am going to London, but from that to getting engaged is a long way. Don't believe the reports from Stockholm. I should esteem it an honor to meet Miss Roosevelt, but I am more interested at present in autos than in matrimony."

Several of the Paris newspapers discuss the matter seriously in articles headed, "Alice Roosevelt a Future Queen."

No more hoboes allowed in Coquille City.

Morrow County, Oregon.

Morrow County is a new country, and like all other new countries, is awaiting development.

Located in the Columbia river valley, and skirted on the South with a spur of the Blue mountains, within the boundaries of Morrow county is a territory 75 miles in length by 35 miles in width, and containing 1,313,280 acres of land. Formerly stockraising was the principal industry, but lately the fertility of the land is bringing agriculture to the front. Immense wheat crops are grown with little cultivation, the soil being mixed with a volcanic ash which is very rich in wheat-producing qualities. The 1904 crop will aggregate 1,400,000 bushels, much of it from virgin soil.

Morrow county has thousands of head of sheep, horses and cattle. The wool production for 1904 was 2,500,000 pounds. Alfalfa and fruit growing are profitable industries, rapidly growing in importance. The county has also a great coal field, soon to be developed.
