 \$1,140,000.

 1904, \$858,310; estimated ordinary
 expenses for 1905, \$890,000.
 Extraordinary expenses for 1904
 —Lewis and Clark Fair, \$250,000;
 Celilo canal, \$100,000; portage
 road, \$165,000; Indian War vet
 erans, \$100,000; total, \$615,000.
 Extraordinary expenses for 1905—
 Lewis and Clark Fair, \$250,000.
 Revenue from corporation tax
 law since May 21, 1903, \$191,
 615 87; estimated annual revenue
 from this source, \$100,000. An
 nual revenue from tax on insur
 ance companies, about \$45,000.
