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## LEWIS AND CLARK FAIR

HENRY BLACKMAN PREDICTS A HOWLING SUCCESS.

Says the Fair Will Pay A Good Dividend to Men Who Own Stock.

Hon. Henry Blackman, who has been in Portland for some time, is home for the holidays. In answer to questions of a Gazette representative in relation to Oregon's metropolis and the Lewis and Clark fair, Mr. Blackman said:

"Portland, at present is quite lively. A great many people are now coming from St. Louis to look after the Oregon exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Fair, and experienced men are now in charge.

"The people that I have met from different states, especially from California, Washington, Idaho and Montana, say that the residents of the last states named are coming en masse, and they give for this two good reasons. First, it is a Pacific Coast affair, being the pride of all the West, and second, that transportation rates will be within the reach of all.

"I believe that thousands will come from the East, as the round trip rate of only \$45 from St. Louis will be a great inducement. This low rate will make the trip easy for many who will

be attracted by the beautiful scenery of the West.

"There is no question in the minds of the men who are in close touch with the fair, but what it will be a howling success.

"The fair will start not a cent in debt. The state has appropriated \$400,000, this being enough to put up the buildings. The corporation has worked hard, and all are good men from the president down. Great credit is due them for the energy, zeal and business judgment shown.

Jeff Myers, who is always at his desk, without a cent of remuneration certainly is worthy of praise, as well as his able corps of assistants.

"Secretary Henry Reid is capable, courteous and attentive and is always willing to lend his assistance.

"Now that President Goode and Col. Henry Dosch, director of exhibits, who are both able exposition men, have returned from the East, things from now on will hum.

It is a pleasure to look over the grounds now which are in the embryo state, for no exposition in the past has accomplished so much six months before the beginning of the fair. The buildings are now practically finished.

"I make this prophecy: It will be the only World's fair, excepting at Omaha, that will pay a good dividend to the stockholders.

"The people of Oregon will be greatly benefitted through the fair.

"Many moneyed men who will come out for the purpose of seeing the fair, will be so infatuated with the environments of our beautiful state that investments will follow and all who have worked to make the fair a success will be greatly benefitted."

## TAX LEVY SEVEN MILLS

THIS AMOUNT FIXED BY THE CITY COUNCIL.

The Limit As Provided For By The City Charter was Ordered.

There was a special meeting of the city council Tuesday at the council chamber with Mayor Gilliam in the chair. Councilmen Quaid, Noble and Cohn answered to roll call.

The meeting was called for the purpose of fixing the city tax levy. Owing to lack of funds, the limit as provided for by the charter, 5½ mills for city purposes and 1½ mills for the sinking fund was ordered.

The special meeting was called for the reason that the law requires that the levy must be on file with the county clerk before the first of the year.
