A Bright Outlook.

The year 1935 is ushered in with bright prospects, especially in the Inland Empire. Never in the history of the country has the outlook been more encouraging. The prosperous year just closed has had a great deal to do with the good feeling that now prevails, especially in the line of agriculture. The wheat crop which was very large and which was turned off at good prices has added encouragement to the farming industry and farmers have exerted more than usual energy to put in another big acreage in a well founded belief that next Fall another good price will be realized. Nature is lending a helping hand, for climatic conditions are about all that could be desired. With plenty of moisture and sunshine, winter wheat is growing right along and is becoming well rooted, thus giving the tender young shoots sufficient strength to stand a little brush of severe weather that might yet occur.

The prospects for high wool prices have not been better within the past twenty years. While it is very early for buyers to commence operations, still the representatives of the large Eastern houses are now in the field and are eager to make contracts for the coming clip at prices that are high. Already a large amount of wool has been contracted for in the Wallowa country. There is much activity in the market for the reason that the supply is short. There is no question as to this. This condition forces competition among the manufacturers who must bid up to get what they want.

All wool buyers freely admit that there will be a material increase over last year's prices.

The wool growers have good foundation for the belief that the lighter grades of wools will reach the 20 cent mark before the season closes. The high price for wool has also stimulated the sheep market and sheep will also show a decided advance.

Within the past two weeks there has been a strong and favorable change in the cattle market, and the long period of stagnation in this important industry assumes a much brighter hue. This is especially applicable to Morrow county and the Butter Creek feeding district. The appearance of Seattle buyers in the field, thus causing sharp competition which for several years has been unknown has helped materially in raising the price. Portland buyers for several years have practically controlled the output of the Butter Creek feeders, but owing to the scarcity in the buying field of the Seattle butchers and shippers, they have invaded the Butter Creek territory making a much better market.

With good prospects for wheat, wool, sheep, and cattle which is practically all that we have to sell, the people of Eastern Oregon ought to enjoy great prosperity.

Lewis and Clark Fair.

Oregon's greatest need is more people. We can well realize this right here in our home county of Morrow. With territory large enough for a state, our population all put together would only make a country village. These conditions exist all over the Inland Empire. In a big and successful fair next year we have a bright ray of hope, something that is well founded in a belief that the fair will stimulate progress and aid in development.
