County Assessor C. P. Strain has received an invitation from Assessor James H. Morton of Union county to attend a meeting of the assessors of the state to be held in Portland on January 23, for the purpose of discussing the methods of placing values on different kinds of property, methods of assessment, census taking and other features of the work of the assessors' office.

The circular states that 21 assessors of the state have responded to the call, in favorable terms and a large attendance is expected. Mr. Strain is not yet certain whether he will be able to attend or not, owing to the preparations for the spring assessment and census taking that will be in progress at that time.

He is heartily in favor of concerted action on the part of the assessors of the state, in fixing values of property

and arriving at some uniformity in methods of assessment, and if possible will attend the meeting.

Portland Sends Contraband.

Portland, Jan. 6.—The steamship Olympia will leave Portland next week with contraband for the Russian army at Vladivostok. The cargo will consist of oats and canned beef.

New Submarines.

Washington, Jan. 6.—Secretary Morton will soon sign a contract with an American company for four submarine boats, the \$600,000 necessary for their construction having been appropriated by the last congress. The boats will be built largely for experimental purposes.

Any and all persons claiming adverse to the above described lands are requested to file their claims in this office of or before the 10th day of March, 1905.

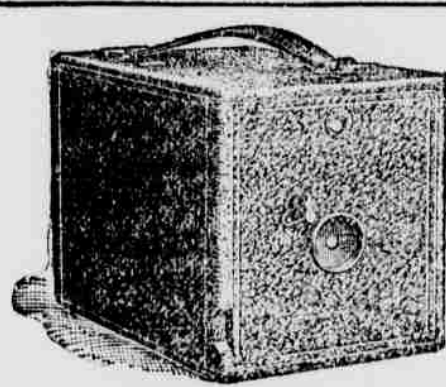

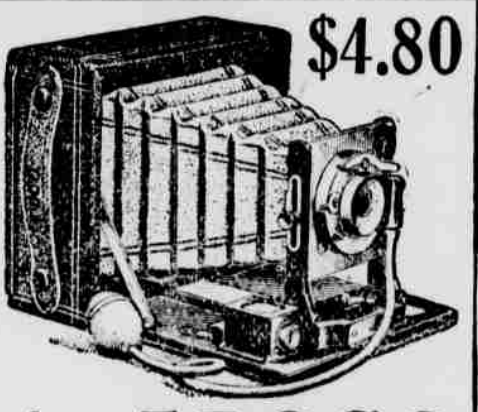
