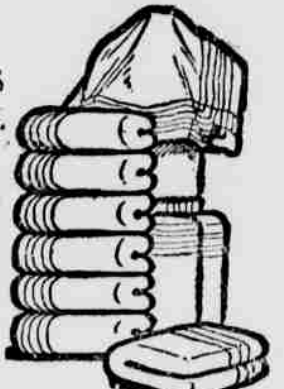

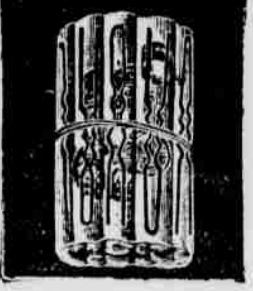

J. S. England alias A. G. Baker wanted in Washington.

The peace and quiet of a busy work shop in the Gazette office was disturbed Monday forenoon when Sheriff Shutt arrested a printer by the name of J. S. England on a charge of forgery from Auburn, Wash.
England came to Heppner about two

weeks past, having walked up from Ione, and was given employment on the Gazette on the day of his arrival.

While here to give the name of A. G. Baker as his own and was a faithful workman, apparently being anxious for a steady place.

He has a wife and child at Ellensburg, Wash., and was visited by the authorities through a telephone message received from his wife last Sunday.

After being arrested, England admitted his guilt, having forged a check for \$22 on J. C. Gregory, a newspaper man, of Auburn, Wash., but says that the money has been returned.

England did not try to conceal anything and was willing to go back to Washington to submit required papers.
