HELP SETTLERS.

Immigrants Given Half Rates On Household Effects.

Right on top of all the advertising of the opportunities to the settler offered by the Pacific coast, which has been done during the past few months and will continue in increased quantities until the end of the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland, comes the announcement from the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company that from February 15 until May 15 will cut its freight rates on immigrants' movables exactly in half, as an additional inducement to the easterner to try his luck in this land of golden promise. It is a practical certainty that the other lines will meet the cut in rates, though no definite word has been received as yet.

On the Harriman lines the rates are good from all Missouri river points to the Willamette river, going as far as Ashland on the Southern Pacific. To these points the rate now is \$1 a hundred. In other words, whereas it costs now \$200 to bring a carload of effects from the Missouri river to the Willamette, it will, during the three months the special rate is in cost only \$100.

To Eastern Washington and Oregon and Idaho, the rate now existing is 75 cents a hundred. The excursion cut is therefore 33 1-3 per cent instead of 50 per cent but the same rates of 50 cents a hundred, with the same minimum will hold during the three months designated.

That this is really a big inducement to the settler to come west at this particular time is shown by the statements that the usual manner in which the settler comes west is to bring his possessions with him. It is the common practice to hire a car for this purpose, in which the immigrant places

his horses, and all stock, his household goods and his manufactured implements, for the character usually used on the farm. This practice has been encouraged by the railroads, and the special rate existing now about one-half the usual amount charged on freight from the east.

Beef Steer Brings \$97.20.

B. T. Burns of Meadowbrook farm, Moscow, Idaho, sold a 22-months-old beef steer in the open market here yesterday for \$97.20. The animal weighed 1520 pounds on foot and sold for 6 cents a pound. It dressed 1005 pounds, or 67 per cent of its live weight, says an Exchange.

The sale illustrates what well-bred and right fed stock will do in this country. The steer was from a grade cow and sired by a registered Shorthorn. He took the \$25 prize last February, offered by the Inland Registered Stock Association for the best steer calf from a common cow and registered bull. When 10 months old the steer weighed 1065 pounds. He was pastured on grass all summer and two months ago was put on feed. He gained 117 pounds the first month.

The association has offered six prizes next year for steers of the same grade. The first prize is \$100; second, \$50, and on down to \$5.

Talk of Extra Session.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The necessity for more money to continue the building of the Navy, for rivers and harbors and for other public works has become so apparent that many members of Congress are changing their views as to the advisability of an extra session in the Spring to revise the tariff in such directions as will increase the revenue.

When an extra session was first talked of there was nearly unanimous sentiment in Congress against it, and there was also a very determined sentiment among all leading Republicans against any revision of the tariff. But since it has been learned that local improvements and necessary appropriations will have to be passed down or omitted

altogether, there has been a decided change of sentiment.

While an extra session is yet a remote contingency, there is a possibility that it may be called for tariff revision, as suggested soon after the election last Fall.

To Relieve Settlers.

Washington, Jan. 6.—Senator Heyburn today introduced a bill today for the relief of entrymen on lands proposed to be irrigated under the reclamation act and unable to cultivate the same, and to provide means of support pending the building of irrigation works. The bill recites that qualified entrymen who have heretofore or shall hereafter make bona fide entry upon lands to be irrigated under the reclamation act may, upon application and showing that water is not available for the irrigation of said lands, obtain leave of absence from their entries for a period not to exceed six months during one year, until water for irrigation is turned into the main canals on the land to be irrigated.

Will Invoke Federal Law.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 6.—Thomas W. Lawson declared today that the real secret of his silence on Amalgamated Copper of late is that the next move against Amalgamated will come from Washington and that a resolution will be introduced in the Senate calling upon Attorney-General Moody to proceed against the company.

A large package of documents containing evidence will be presented to Mr. Moody, and the proceedings will be in line with those against the Central Paper Company and the Northern Securities Company. Mr. Lawson himself or his counsel, will furnish the evidence and will also ask the Attorney-General to act, if the Senate resolution fails.

A large road engine bought five years ago by a Silver Lake merchant for hauling freight, has been sold to a Bend sawmill firm. It was not a success on the road, but the mill men think they can make it do the work of 30 horses.
