For New County.

The people of the north part of Grant county will ask the present session of the legislature to create them a new county known as Lewis and Clark county. Their claim or right to ask that a new county be created of that part of Grant county is just, and should be fairly considered by every resident of the John Day valley. The only question for arbitration or agreement is the division line. It should be as far as possible on a line of survey and not the watershed of a mountain. Grant county at present has three uncertain boundary lines: The forty-fifth parallel on the north; the mountain summit on the east and the line of the old Malheur Indian reservation on the south. An attempt will be made to correct the first and the last named of these boundaries by special act during the present session of the legislature. In the matter of the division of Grant county, let the people of the proposed new county adopt a surveyed line for a boundary that comes the nearest being the watershed of the John Day valley, and little or no objection will be made to the creation of the new Lewis and Clark county. —Blue Mountain Eagle.
