

BATTLE OF THE WINDS.

North and South Winds Show
Great Struggles for Supremacy.

During the winter months Heppner people can witness a phenomenon that is interesting. It is the battle of the cold winds coming from the north and coming in contact with the warm chinook winds of the south. In the neighborhood of the O. R. & N. depot seems to be a favorite battling ground for the elements in a struggle for supremacy. As a forerunner the cold northern winds push ahead the dense fogs of the Columbia, and this is what makes the interesting spectacle. The warm chinook winds coming in from the south will meet this fog and then the battle begins. If the south winds win then the fog is driven back and we have a clear atmosphere and warm weather, but the contestants seem to be pretty evenly matched and it is often a see saw game for a day at a time. The fog will be driven back for a few hundred yards by the southerly winds and then the north winds will have a turn and we will be enveloped in fog. While it seems strange, but it is a fact in the northern part of town under the influence of the northerly winds there will be frost and a chilly atmosphere while in the southern portion of Heppner under the influence of the chinook wind, it will be warm and spring like showing a marked difference of climate within an area north and south of less than a mile.

Back and forth the fog rolls and surges showing the strength of the mighty elements.

The term chinook applied to the southerly winds is a common phrase among the people of the northwest coast. The fact that they are warm about the only explanation that is ever given in relation to the cause or origin. While these winds cover a great portion of the western country, here in Eastern Oregon the effect is seemingly more marked than in other portions that they cover. When these winds appear frost and snow seem to disappear as if by magic. During the past week the chinook winds have been very beneficial to crops and ranges.

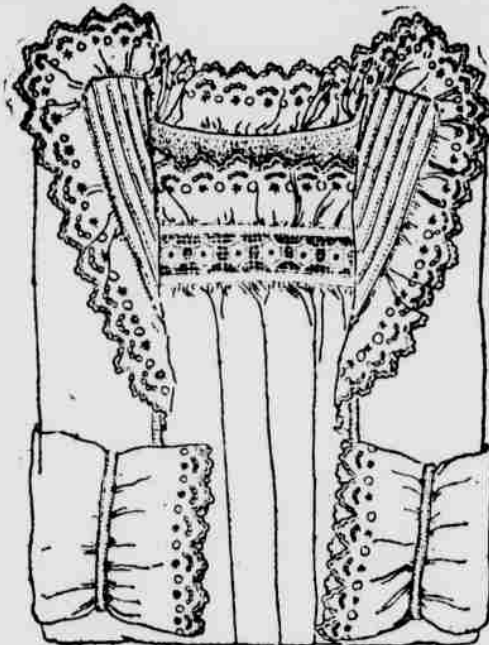
