### Jay Cooke Dead.

Philadelphia, Feb. 16.—Jay Cooke, whose fame as a financier is world-wide, and who was closely associated with the construction of the Northern Pacific Railroad and the development of the Northwest, died tonight at the home of his son-in-law, Charles D. Barney, at Ogontz, a suburb of this city, aged 83 years.

He had been suffering from general debility, the result of old age, for several years. His condition was not considered serious, however, and his death tonight came rather suddenly. Last Monday he entertained as his guests 125 young ladies attending the Ogontz school and their friends. On that occasion he appeared to be in good spirits and was the last to leave the reception room.

Mr. Cooke's family, relatives and friends were notified of his illness early today, and many of them were present when he died. None except his closest neighbors knew he was ill.

### Murdered For His Money.

Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 16.—That an unknown man, whose headless body will probably never be identified, was done to death for what his pocket contained is revealed by the Coroner's verdict in the case of the remains found between Irrigon and Umatilla Tuesday. The verdict was that the man "came to his death at the hands of an unknown person." Robbery was the apparent object, as the pockets had been turned inside out, and there was nothing left by which to identify the remains. The body was found by G. R. Jones, of Irrigon, in a patch of willows about three miles from Umatilla. Head and feet had been cut off, and the man had been dead several months. The clothing appeared of good material.

### Big Lumber Order.

Quartermaster-general Humphrey has awarded to the Portland Lumber Company the contract for supplying 2,140,457 feet of lumber, to be used in the construction of Army buildings in the Philippines. The shipment will be made by steamer direct from this city. The amount involved in the order is something over \$20,000. Bids on this lot were opened December 20.

### Railroad Sold.

A deal has consummated by which the Goble, N. halem & Pacific Railroad and a tract of 7000 acres of Columbia County red fir is transferred to William Reid, an extensive Michigan lumber operator, the purchase price being in the neighborhood of \$200,000. Mr. Reid purchased the property from Robert Smith, F. S. Stanley, W. S. Dwinell and L. C. Stanley. Messrs. Smith and F. S. Stanley are Portland capitalists, Mr. Dwinell lives in Minneapolis and F. S. Stanley in Chippewa Falls.

### General Lew Wallace Dead.

Crawfordsville, Ind., Feb. 16.—Having failed in health for several years, General Lew Wallace died last night in this city at the age of 78 years. Present at the deathbed were his physicians, his wife, his son, Henry Wallace, of Indianapolis, and the latter's wife. Death came peacefully and, bidding farewell to his family, the author of "Ben Hur" whispered that he was ready to meet his Maker. With this he lapsed into unconsciousness, and soon passed away.
