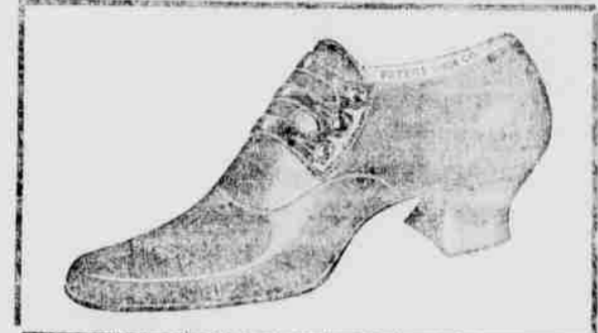

Quite a number of yearling wethers have been contracted for in the neighborhood of Arlington. Prices have ranged from \$2 to \$2.25 per head. This is from 50c to 75c better than the prices paid last year for yearling wethers.

The East Oregonian says that Pendleton's offering to the progress of the country during the past year is 95 new dwelling and business houses, costing \$264,000, exclusive of the three new school houses, costing over \$60,000.

The Morrow County Land & Trust Company has been reorganized and has been consolidated with the Heppner Milling Co., the new company will be known as the Morrow Warehouse Milling Company. With the addition of the Milling company the capital stock has been increased to \$35,000. The old officers of the M. C. L. & T. Co. will hold over until the first meeting of the new company which will be held in July.
