WOOL IS BEING SOLD

GROWERS ARE LETTING GO AT
GOOD PRICES.

The Pendleton Scouring Mills
Have Made Big Purchases of
Heavy Grade Wools.

Mills Bros. are among the first to sell
their wool this season in Morrow county.
The clip of about 25,000 pounds was
sheared early. Bob Wilkinson, of The
Dalles, was the purchaser and the price
paid was 17 cents per pound.

E. J. Burke, representing the Pendle-
ton Scouring Mills, made quite a clean
up in the lower part of Morrow county
during the past week. Mr. Burke pur-
chased the clips of B. P. Doherty, Mc-
Cabe Bros., Frank Kilkenny, Ed Mc-
Daid, James Carty, Pat Carty, Pat Orr-
rin, C. C. Curtis, and Doherty & Mc-
Daid. The wool will aggregate between
300,000 and 400,000 pounds. The prices
ranged from 13¼ to 14¾ cents per
pound.

G. W. French has sold his clip of
6000 fleeces, amounting to about 50,-
000 pounds to Sam Wilkinson for 18c
per pound.

The first new wool of the season was
received Saturday at the warehouse of
the Morrow Warehouse Milling Co.
The wool was sent in from Spray by
Win Potter.

Odd Fellows Celebration.

Mitchell Pleads Not Guilty.

Portland, April 11.—To three of the
four indictments Senator Mitchell,
through his attorney, Judge A. S. Ben-
nett, entered a plea of not guilty; to the
fourth he demurred and filed a plea in
abatement. Judge Bennett explained
to the court that three of the indict-
ments charged acts involving moral
torpitude, and as to these his client de-
sired early trial and would interpose no
dilatory motions, but as to the remain-
ing indictment, which in his opinion
charged only a technical offense, he
would raise objections to the validity of
the proceedings that have been had.
Inasmuch as the plea in abatement
filed to this last indictment attacks the
validity of the grand jury's proceedings,
it would, it sustained, have the effect of
overthrowing all of the indictments
which have been returned

KIDNAPED HER OWN CHILD.

TAKEN FROM ORPHAN'S HOME
AT PORTLAND.

Secret Disclosed by Becoming In-
toxicated—Child Taken Back
to Portland.

The old story that when a woman
gets down she goes to the very bottom
seems to have been exemplified in
Heppner this week.

A strange woman came here from
Portland and with her was a little girl
three years old. From the action of the
woman she was refused admittance at
the hotels and Sunday went out on the
streets with the child. The woman was
so badly intoxicated that she could
hardly stand up and finally took refuge
to sleep off her drunken stupor in a
wood pile belonging to the Light &
Water Co. Here she was located by
Marshal Rasmus, who owing to the ten-
der years of the child did not want to look
her up and she was turned over to the
county authorities, Judge Avers giving
her quarters at the county poor house.

The woman who is also a "dope"
fiend told many conflicting and contra-
dictory stories, however, upon investi-
gation the presence of the child reveals
a sad story. She gave her name as
Perry, but it has been learned that her
true name is St. Clair, and that owing to
her wayward life the child had been
taken away from her by respectable
relatives and had been placed in charge
of the Boys and Girls Aid Society of
Portland. The woman had kidnaped the
little girl which she had dressed in
boys clothes and was trying to get
away, but while here again gave way
to her vicious habits which led to the
discovery.

After being taken to the poor house
the woman slipped away with the child
and took the little girl away upon the
hill back of the school house where she
was secreted and left all alone in a
badger hole. Soon after being missed
search was instituted and the woman
was found and was induced to tell
where the child was. A representative
of the Boys and Girls Aid Society came
up Tuesday and took the child back.

Yesterday's Oregonian adds the fol-
lowing to a dispatch sent by the Oregon-
ian correspondent from this city:

The 3-year-old girl, mentioned in the
above dispatch, was taken away from
her mother, Mrs. Eunice St. Clair, sev-
eral months ago, and placed with D.
Winters under the supervision of the
Boys' and Girls' Aid Society. Mr. Win-
ter is a near relative of Mrs. St. Clair
and lives on East Davis street.

Last week the child mysteriously dis-
appeared, and Superintendent Gardner,
of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, was
immediately notified and a search insti-
tuted, which was barren of results. It
was suspected at that time that the
mother had kidnaped the girl, as she
was passionately fond of her daughter.
Mrs. St. Clair was heartbroken when
the child was taken away from her.
For years she has been in the grasp of
the drink habit, despite her efforts to
reform. She was always very kind to
the child when she was not drinking.

Several months ago the people of
Troutdale were horror-stricken to find a
woman living in a wagon with a 3-year-
old girl baby. They tried to take the
child away from the woman, who was
Mrs. St. Clair, but she refused all over-
