Heppner ought to send a representative body to the meeting of the Oregon Development League which holds forth in Portland on April 26.

The Range Protection Association of Grant county is rather selfish. A few people who want to hog it all will find it hard work to build a fence around the county of Grant.

A farm of 160 acres near Athena sold for \$75 an acre. It never produces less than 30 bushels of wheat an acre. Morrow county has hundreds of acres of wheat lands that will produce 30 bushels to the acre when under a proper state of cultivation, and \$75 will buy seven and one-half acres of it.

June 7 will be "Pendleton Day" at the Lewis and Clark fair and every citizen who can pull away from business at that time should join in a monster excursion for the fair that day.—Pendleton E. O June 7 will also be "Heppner Day" at the fair, and we are right with you. What we lack in population we will try and make up in enthusiasm. We will do this thing right.

Such a good opportunity to advertise the resources of Morrow county at the Lewis and Clark fair will probably never occur again. Through the fair Oregon has received more advertising than ever before. It has made Eastern people begin to think about Oregon. Thousands will take advantage of the low railroad rates and come to this state this summer. Many of these people will invest in Oregon property and become permanent residents. We want to impress these people with the cold facts in relation to our resources and opportunities. To do this will require some effort on the part of our citizens.

The meeting of the State Development League which will convene in Portland on the 26th of this month will be an important meeting and should bear fruit. Every town in Eastern Oregon should be represented. In speaking of the greatest question that will come before the league, the Journal says: "One of the best things done by the state league at its last meeting was its adoption of a resolution endorsing the portage railroad project. There should and probably will be delegates in attendance at the next meeting who will be desirous of realizing everything possible from that great public enterprise and who will have something to say about the opening of the river above Celilo falls. This indeed should be one of the great features of the gathering for boats on the upper river will complete the first step toward commercial freedom in Oregon and it should naturally receive the heartiest encouragement of a state league formed for the purpose of developing the resources and potentialities of Oregon."

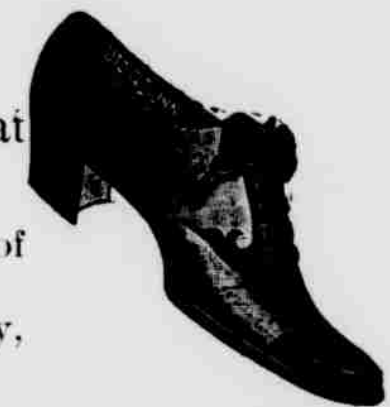
