

DYING IN SCORES.

People of Tonopah Are Stricken by Plague.

Reno, Nev., April 14.—Hundreds of people flocked into Reno on the Virginia & Truckee train tonight, fleeing from the sickness now so prevalent at Tonopah. Every train for a week has been crowded, and, strange as it may seem, the incoming trains have been filled also. The people of the town have taken the matter in hand, and tomorrow morning the Nevada State Journal, of this place, will send in a physician, Dr. Heppner, late of the United States Army, who has been through a number of plagues. He goes to find the true conditions in the camp, and will submit a report soon after his arrival there. Governor Sparks tomorrow will also appoint a special medical commission and send the members into Tonopah. These men will co-operate with the physicians of the camp and at once begin a campaign to check the disease that is mowing down people at the rate of from five to 25 each day.

Yesterday 12 bodies were stretched out on slabs in the only undertaking establishment in the camp. An equal number, at least, were dead around the town. The disease strikes without warning, the healthy being the most susceptible, and in from 12 to 24 hours are dead, the bodies blackened by the mysterious poison that raps their lives away.

Every train into Reno for the past week has been bringing all the way from 100 to 250 people, bound anywhere to escape the ravages of a dread disease or plague that has fastened itself upon the great mining camp. Some are terror-stricken, others frightened, but all are intent on the one object—to get to a country where people are not stricken without warning and die in a day. They all bring stories of death. Some say the death rate amounts to 25 a day; others reduce the number to 10 and 15, while a few maintain that the rate has been only three or four a day. On the other hand, the undertakers from Tonopah tonight state that the total number of deaths for the past 15 days has been only 15.

With it all, the people of Tonopah have held a mass meeting. In less than an hour \$2000 was raised, and now the fight to stamp out the dread malady, whatever it is, is in progress.

Seed Dipping Vats.

"The greatest need in the livestock industry in Oregon right now," said a Montana sheep buyer to the East Oregonian, "is a system of public dipping plants near every large shipping point in the state."

"The federal inspection regulations are strict and in order to comply, Oregon must get a move on herself. Her stockmen should take immediate steps to organize for the construction of modern, up-to-date dipping plants, at Pendleton, Heppner, Condon, Meacham, Elgin, Baker City and Huntington. As it is now the dipping facilities are poor and consequently the sheep are not sound. As long as the method of dipping stock is not complete, disease is sure to be harbored, only to break out at unexpected times and places and this condition will place Oregon on the black list among breeders and buyers."

"The only way in which disease can be permanently eradicated is to construct proper dipping plants, under direction of the federal inspectors who are familiar with these matters and then comply with every regulation imposed, and in addition by dipping about twice a year for safety when not required by law."

"Oregon is one of the leading sheep states and it is unfortunate that the dipping facilities are so poor. Echo is the only point in the entire state that possesses a modern dipping plant. The stockmen of other localities should combine in constructing permanent plants in order to facilitate shipments. These plants should be about a day's drive for a herd of sheep, from principal shipping

points, where grass can be had. The federal inspectors should be asked to assist in making plans for the dipping plants, as great economy and convenience can be secured by scientific plans, such as Echo possesses."

"The states of Idaho, Utah and Montana are far ahead of Oregon in this matter. If Oregon wishes to hold her place among great sheep shipping states she must get right in her inspection laws and regulations."

Build On to Bend.

Seattle, Wash., April 14.—John Heimrich, president of the Great Southern Railway, which yesterday deposited a \$5,000,000 trust deed with the Washington Trust Company, of Seattle, said today of his building plans:

"The Great Southern plans an immediate construction of 45 miles of road, and is permitted under the terms of its articles of incorporation to extend into California and Washington. An extension as far as Bend, Or., is certain to be made as soon as the immediate construction work is completed. "Grading for 30 miles of track is completed, and the steel is on the ground for track-laying. Terminal work at The Dalles is under way, and by July 1 we will be ready to operate 30 miles of track. This extension will take the line as far south as Dufer, the heart of a rich agricultural district. It has been estimated that it costs \$2 per ton to move wheat out of that district, and the last crop reports showed 1,700,000 bushels raised annually. In addition, the district is rich in horticultural possibilities."

"The new line runs out of The Dalles west of the Deschutes River, with a maximum grade of 1.5. The surveys of the engineering department farther south show this grade will be decreased. The highest point the new line will reach is 2260 feet."
