Don't overlook that Commercial Club.

The opening day of the Lewis and Clark fair on June 1, has been designated as a legal holiday.

The splendid growing weather this spring means prosperity for the farmers, and prosperity for the farmers means prosperity for everybody.

At least twelve new residences are to be built in Heppner this spring. Some of the buildings are already under way. Heppner is a good town and is growing.

The enterprise of the county court in appropriating \$2000 for an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair is creditable. A great majority of the people of Morrow county desire to see a good exhibit, and now that we have plenty of funds, there will be no question about it.

Mayor Williams, of Portland, was re-nominated mayor in the direct primary Saturday by a plurality of about 1000 votes by the republicans. Dr. Harry Lane had a walk over as the choice of the democrats. Under the direct primary the people have two elections to decide their choice.

A move is now on foot to organize a commercial club in Heppner. Already about fifty citizens have signed the roll and indications are favorable for successful organization. An organized body of progressive citizens can do much for any town. Heppner has a little too much mass. In the procession of Oregon towns we are entitled to a place right at the front. But we must enter the roll.

The second annual picnic at Echo was a great success. Governor Chamberlain, Senator Fulton and many other prominent people were there. The affair is the result of a little enterprise of Echo citizens and will be of lasting benefit to the thriving town. A large number of people were there. They were all well treated. They all went away with a good impression of Echo. They will talk about it. The Echo spirit goes a long way in building up a town. Here is an impressive object lesson for Heppner.

Considerable interest is being shown in the question of road improvement in Oregon. The meeting of the State Good Roads association to be held in Pendleton on the 15th and 16th of this month promises to be interesting and well attended. Every county in the state should be well represented. Eastern Oregon will send a large and representative delegation to the meeting of the national association which will be held in Portland in June. At the Portland meeting delegations will attend from not only every state in the Union, but there will be good roads enthusiasts from Canada, France, England and Germany, who will be there to exchange ideas and explain methods of scientific road building. Permanent highway improvement is of great importance and should receive more attention from the people in general.

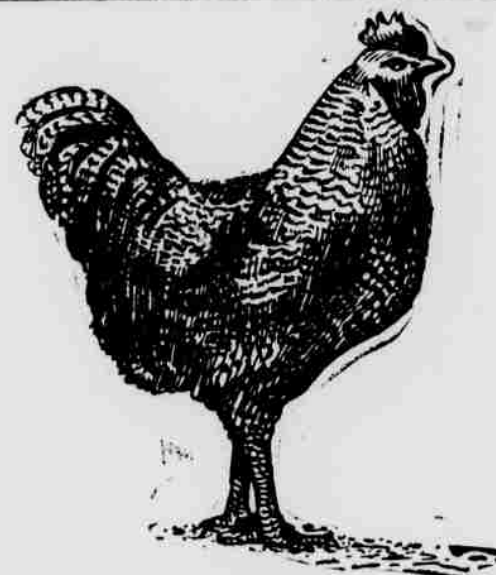
