The following sales are reported: Farley Bros., 20,000 pounds; Andrew Rood, 20,000 pounds at 19 1/4 cents per pound; A. M. Markham, 20,000 pounds at 19 cents per pound; W. B. Barrett, 30,000 pounds at 19 cents per pound; J. R. Nunnamaker, 50,000 pounds at 19 1/2 cents per pounds.

The following subjects will be discussed at the Baptist church next Lord's Day: "Pressing to the Work" and "Making Room for Jesus."

The weekly report from the climate and crop service of the weather bureau shows favorable conditions all over the state. The rains during the past week were heavier east of the Cascades than in Western Oregon.

Last Monday the grove at Lexington was put in shape for the county Sunday School rally, which will be held there June 8. Every Sunday School in the county will be asked to furnish something for the program. The program will consist of music, recitation and addresses. A part of the program will be rendered in the forenoon and the remainder in the afternoon. There will be a basket dinner.

Judge T. W. Ayers is now busy in making arrangements for a shipment of material for a booth at the Lewis and Clark fair and also for a shipment of the first installment of Morrow county's exhibit which will leave here Saturday. The material to build a booth will be selected pine from Morrow county and also other specimens of wood that grow here. The first shipment of wheat will consist of about 50 bushels which will be sacked and after it reaches its destination in Portland will all be put up in small sacks for free distribution to visitors. Former expositions have proven that a great many of the visitors who are farmers like to take a sample of something that they can take home with them and plant for experiment, especially the farmers from the East. A great many small sacks of Morrow county wheat will be put up for this purpose and will serve as a splendid advertisement for one of the best wheat growing counties in the state of Oregon. A big stuffed elk and a cage of stuffed birds, all of which have been killed in Morrow county will form a part of Saturday's shipment. Dave Herren has charge of our coal and building stone exhibit and will get out an

attractive display. R. F. Hynd, of Heppner, Mr. White, of Lexington, and Wes McNabb, of Ione, will have charge of the collection and furnishing of wheat. The wheat exhibit will include both threshed and in the straw. Commissioner Henry Blackman will have charge of the installation and care of the exhibit at the fair.
