FAIRBANKS WILL OPEN FAIR.

Coming to Portland as Represen-
tative of President.

Washington, May 13.—Vice-Presi-
dent Fairbanks intended to leave for his
Indiana home last night to spend the
next two months with his family, but
he received word that the President
wanted to see him, and called at the
White House at 11:30 today. The
President told him of his deep interest
in the Lewis and Clark Exposition and
his regret that he himself could not at-
tend the opening of it. He said, how-
ever, that the Administration should be
represented, and to his mind nothing
would be more appropriate than that
the second official of the Nation should
represent the President on that occa-
sion. Mr. Fairbanks promptly fell in
with the President's suggestion, and
expressed his thorough willingness to
go to Portland, and has now changed
his plans so as to reach Portland the
last week in May. He and Mrs. Fair-
banks will be present to participate in
the opening ceremonies. The Vice-
President will make the principal
speech of the occasion.

Being unable to get to Portland either
at the opening of the Exposition or later
in the summer, the President has ac-
cepted the invitation extended to him
by President Goode to press the button
which be the signal for the formal open-
ing of the Exposition, at 1 o'clock on
the afternoon of June 1—that is 1
o'clock Portland time, 4 o'clock Wash-
ington time. A special through tele-
graph wire will be run from the East
Room of the White House into the Ex-
position grounds at Portland. At the
Washington end will be the same gold
key which President Roosevelt used to
open the St. Louis Exposition last year,
and which former Presidents used to
open the Chicago, Buffalo and other
expositions of times past.

There will be considerable ceremony
attending the opening of the Exposition
from Washington. Members of the
Diplomatic Corps, members of the Cab-
inet and Army and Navy officers will be
invited to the White House, and the
President will press the key which will
set in motion the machinery at Port-
land, and the Lewis and Clark Ex-
position will be in full swing.

Secretary of the Treasury Shaw called
on the President just before luncheon
and stated that he had appointed As-
sistant Secretary H. A. Taylor to suc-
ceed the late W. H. Hills as the Treas-
ury representative on the Government
Board. Mr. Taylor ranks the other
members and the President promptly
designated him to also succeed Mr.
Hills as chairman.

No member of the Cabinet will be
able to attend the opening of the Port-
land Exposition, though almost every
department will be represented. Chair-
man Taylor and the following members
of the Government Board expect to be
present: Michael, State Department;
Scotfield, War Department; Clay, De-
partment of Justice; Chance, Postoffice
Department; Peters, Navy Department;
Burch, Agricultural Department; First
Assistant Postmaster-General Hitch-
cock, representing the Department of
Commerce and Labor; True, Smithson-
ian Institution, and Chief Clerk Geddes,
of the board. Secretary Wilson, of the
Agricultural Department, expects to
visit the Fair during the summer, and
so do Secretary Metcalfe, of the Depart-
ment of Commerce and Labor, and
Postmaster General Cortelyou.

IN JOINT SESSION.

Good Roads Men and Development
Leaguers Meet.

Pendleton, Or., May 15.—Among the
most prominent men in the state are
those in attendance upon the joint con-
vention of the Oregon Good Roads As-
sociation and the Oregon Development
League, which is holding a two days'
session in this city.

Ex-Senator T. C. Taylor opened the
convention this morning in the rooms of
the Pendleton Commercial Association
at 10 o'clock. Addresses of welcome
were delivered by County Judge Henry
J. Bean, on behalf of Umatilla county,
and Senator Walter M. Pierce, on be-
half of Mayor Matlock and the City of
Pendleton. Responses were made by
Hon. John H. Scott, of Salem, presi-
dent of the Good Roads Association,
and Hon. Tom Richardson, of Portland,
secretary of the State Development
League.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell read letters
from several prominent Oregonians who
were invited to attend the meeting but
found it impossible to be present, and
Editor A. Bennett, of the Irrigator Irri-
gator, then took charge of the meeting
and formed it into a session of the De-
velopment League.

Brief addresses were made upon the
development question by Hon. T. G.
Bailey, Mayor Esteb. of Echo, Hon.
Tom Richardson, Judge Ryan, of Clack-
amas county; Colonel R. W. Richard-
son, secretary of the National Good
Roads Association; Senator Haines
and Commissioner Hill, of Baker county.
The meeting was then adjourned
until 2 o'clock, when the convention re-
assembled and was called to order by
President John H. Scott, who made a
few remarks in regard to the good roads
question.

Senator Jay Tuttle, of Clatsop county,
was unable to be present, but he pre-
pared a paper upon the subject which
had been assigned to him, and it was
read by Senator Smith, of Pendleton.
Discussion followed the Senator's
paper, led by Hon. N. Whealdon, of
The Dalles.

Hon. John H. Albert, of Salem, gave
a short address upon "The Cost and
Utility of Rock Roads," and the discus-
sion of the subject was led by Hon.
Chas. A. Barrett, of Athena.

John S. Beall, of Portland, was called
upon for a talk upon "Road Machinery
and Its Cost," and the discussion was
led by Joseph B. McDill, Ed L. Smith
and A. Kunkel, of Pendleton.

Governor and Mrs. Chamberlain ar-
rived this evening and were tendered a
reception by the ladies of Pendleton.
Although this was an inopportune affair
and the ladies had scarcely 24 hours in
which to prepare for it, everything
passed off very smoothly. After the re-
ception an informal ball was given in
the music hall, after which the Govern-
or attended a special meeting of the
Eagles' Lodge, which was held in his
honor.

Matthews Removed.

Washington, D. C., May 13.—W. F.
Matthews was removed today by Presi-
dent Roosevelt from the office of United
States marshal of Oregon, and Charles
J. Reed of Portland was appointed to
succeed him. The reason assigned for
the removal of Matthews is "lack of
harmony with the land fraud prosecu-
tions."

Walter F. Matthews received a notice
by wire from Washington this morning
that he had been removed from the of-
fice of United States marshal. The re-
moval takes effect immediately and his
successor, Charles J. Reed, will qualify
as soon as he receives official notice of
his appointment.

Matthews spent the morning in pre-
paring to vacate his office.

The president's action was taken up-
on the recommendation of Francis J.
Heney, United States district attorney.
The notice of removal was contained in
the following telegram, received by
Matthews this morning:

"Washington, May 13.—Walter F.
Matthews, Portland, Oregon—In view
of the recommendation of United States
Attorney Heney, the president has this
day removed you from the office of
United States marshal for the district of
Oregon, to take effect immediately.

South and Eastern Oregon Wool.

The highest price ever paid for South-
ern Oregon wool put the Herrin and
Barron clips into the hands of Portland
buyers. The sale was made at Ashland
and the figure was 26 cents. Herrin &
Son have begun shearing and expect to
have 12,000 of wool of the latest clip.
It is reported that the wool from this
shearing will average \$2.50 per sheep
in value to Herrin & Son. Shearing
has not yet begun at the Barron ranch,
but the yield is expected to be about
10,000 pounds.

Ewen McLennan, the largest owner
of sheep in Wasco county, has sold his
clip of wool, amounting to about 160,-
000 pounds, to a Boston firm. The
price is reported to have been 20½
cents a pound. Other sales of wool re-
ported in that territory are: Wagner &
Boyer, 7300 fleeces; Knox & Caldwell,
2800 fleeces; C. P. Ragsdale, 30,000
pounds, and Donald McKay, 1900
fleeces. All these purchases were
made by J. N. Burgess for Koshland &
Co. The McKay wool brought 21 cents,
the other lots 20 cents.

Judge Bellinger is Dead.

Portland, May 12.—Judge Charles B.
Bellinger, of the United States district
court of Oregon, died this afternoon at
3:40 o'clock from a complication of
diseases.
