The Morrow county educational exhibit is practically completed and will be shipped to Portland the first of next week. All interested in seeing the work are invited to come to the school on Friday afternoon, May 19, between the hours of one and four.

The weekly crop bulletin of the government weather bureau shows considerable rainfall all over the state during the past week. Wheat crop conditions continue satisfactory. Hops in Western Oregon are uneven and indications are now that the yield will be light. The fruit crop has suffered considerable injury from frosts.

The bar of Pendleton is practically unanimous in its recommendation of James A. Fee for federal judge. A petition addressed to President Roosevelt asking for the appointment of Judge James A. Fee as successor to Judge C. B. Bellinger has been circulated among the members of the legal profession of this city and practically all have signed it.—Pendleton Tribune. Judge Fee is a man of recognized ability and legal learning. In this district he was on the bench for eight years where he served with ability that is well known throughout the legal fraternity of the state. Judge Fee's high standing as a jurist and a man entitles him to recognition for the important position left vacant by the death of Judge Bellinger. No man in Oregon is better fitted for the place. Eastern Oregon will be unanimous in the endorsement of Judge Fee, of Pendleton.

Circuit Court.

Circuit court was convened in this city Monday by Judge Bradshaw, of The Dalles.

The first day was taken up with the reading of the docket and empaneling the grand jury and the trial of the case of the state of Oregon vs. P. C. Creswell, charged with an assault with a dangerous weapon.

The case went to the jury at 7 o'clock Monday evening, and a verdict of simply assault was returned. Defendant's fine was assessed at \$200.

The case of Fred Munroe, of Arlington, who held a bill of sale of wheat belonging to W. J. C. Fleming, which was attached by C. T. Walker, of Ione, in which Munroe brought action against Walker for the value of the wheat, was decided in favor of Walker by the jury.

The damage suit of Bowen vs. Sheriff Shutt came up yesterday afternoon and up to this time no decision has been made.

Wm. Reed, of Ione, who pleaded guilty to gambling was fined \$50 each on two charges, for gambling and for allowing gambling in his place of business.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Decoration Day Will be Appropriately Observed in Heppner.

At a meeting of the Grand Army veterans and the W. R. C. on the 17th inst., it was decided to observe Memorial Sunday and Decoration Day this season in Heppner.

On Memorial Sunday, which occurs on the 28th of this month, there will be union services at the M. E. church at 11 o'clock. A special invitation is extended to all veterans, both union and confederate, and to everybody in general, especially the fraternal organizations.

On Decoration Day, May 30, the graves of veterans will be decorated by a special committee appointed for this purpose. The graves will be decorated in the forenoon.

In the afternoon a basket dinner will be served in the Masonic hall under the management of the W. R. C. for the veterans, W. R. C. and invited guests.

It is the intention to form a big procession at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon and march through the principal streets. Sheriff Shutt will be the marshal of the day.

At 2:30 o'clock there will be musical and literary exercises at Roberts' opera house, to which all are invited.

It is to be hoped that the people in general will take an interest in this matter and help the old boys in blue to properly observe Memorial Day.

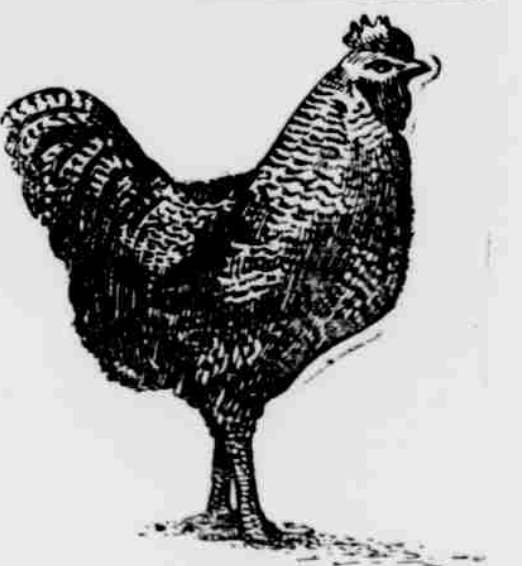
