WANT A RAILROAD.

Eight-Mile Farmers Hold Enthusiastic Meeting.

The farmers of Eight-Mile want a railroad and they want it bad.

The prosperous tillers of the soil who reside in the great wheat belt of Morrow county who last year raised the big end of Morrow county's 1,300,000 bushels of wheat are getting tired of hauling their wheat by wagon and team for long and tedious miles that not only wears out wagons and teams, but men as well.

Saturday last at the Eight-Mile school house was the second meeting that has been held for the purpose of getting the sentiment of the farmers and to make a start in devising ways and means to interest capital so that the desired object may be attained.

The meeting last Saturday, which was attended by about 200 people, was enthusiastic. While there was some disappointment owing to the fact that a speaker failed to arrive, the meeting was a success and permanent organization was effected.

J. L. Swift acted as temporary chairman and addressed the meeting in which he ably presented the facts and conditions that now confront a prosperous community.

P. Bruner, A. J. Hicks, Fred Warnock and others offered suggestions and gave short talks. Permanent organization resulted in the election of C. E. Jones president and John Hughes, secretary. A committee of five to assist the officers was appointed as follows: J. W. Chadwick, P. Brenner, D. S. Barlow, Mr. Robison and J. W. Beckett.

By no means the least enjoyable feature of the occasion was a most excellent basket dinner generously provided by the wives of the Eight Mile farmers.

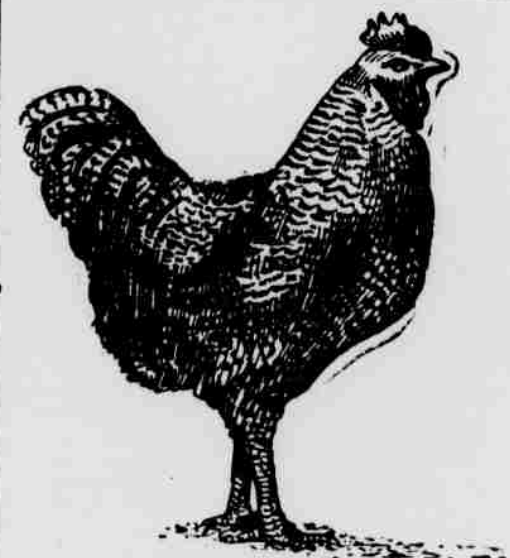
