## MORROW COUNTY DEFEATED.

Condon Wins From Morrow County—Score 8 to 7.

A special train carried about one hundred people from Heppner and Lexington last Sunday to witness the ball game between Condon and Morrow County. The game was fast and exciting all the way through and was anybody's game until the last man was out in the last inning.

Morrow County, with one or two exceptions, apparently had the better team, but was not so steady at critical times.

Condon led off at bat and got a man as far as third base, but there were already two down and the third was an easy out from Wick'ersham to Havre.

In Morrow County's half after the first two up, went out Barker hit for two bases, but died there because the necessary hit could not be made.

In the second inning both teams went out in one, two, three order. In the third Condon made three by the assistance of O'Neil's error and Havre's wild toss to the plate.

In the fourth there was nothing doing for either side, but in the fifth Condon again started things by a hit and two errors in the out field and when their half of the fifth was over they had annexed two more runs.

Morrow County came up strong in their half. Wick'ersham got a hit, Spaulding a base on balls, advancing "Wick" to second, then a double steal and a hit to left field by Barker scored two runs.

Havre's hit scored Barker, and Ball's hit scored Havre. At this time things looked pretty good for Morrow County, but the hit which was needed to tie the score could not be made.

Again in the sixth neither side scored but each team made three in the seventh. With one down Condon made a bit and assisted by two more errors filled the bases. In trying to cut off the runner at third, Havre again threwed wild, letting in the three runs.

Morrow County came back in their half assisted by two hits and as many errors scored their three runs. This ended the scoring of the game, Condon going out one, two, three in the eighth, Morrow County getting a man to third.

In the ninth both sides played good ball, trying their best to score one more, but both pitchers were too effective.

Taken as a whole it was a well played game with the exception of a few bad errors which must necessarily happen in a ball game.

Morrow County expects to play a return game at Condon some time in the near future and to try and wipe out this defeat as this is Morrow County's first game lost this season.

We are not able to give Condon's line-up, but Morrow County lined up as before.

# THE FAIR

## Lane Elected Mayor.

Portland, June 6.—Dr. Harry Lane, democrat, was elected mayor of Portland yesterday by a plurality of 1216 over George H. Williams, the present incumbent, attorney general in Grant's cabinet, and denominated by his admirers as the "Grand Old Man" of Oregon politics.

The total vote was 14,648, Dr. Lane receiving 7587, Williams, 6371, and the socialist and prohibitionist candidates 690, giving Lane a clear majority over all of 526.

Over 500 electors did not vote for mayor, all leaving this blank on their ballots. Larry Sullivan, the notorious sailor boarding house keeper, was beaten by Hugh Wallace, a democrat. Fred Merrill was also defeated by a democrat and in the tenth ward, W. T. Vaughan, a democrat, was elected. All the other city officials are republicans.

Two democratic councilmen have been elected and one independent republican, the latter defeating Larry Sullivan, well known boarding house runner, for councilman in the third ward.

George J. Cameron, independent republican candidate for municipal judge, was elected.

The vote polled was unexpectedly light. It was believed the bitterness of the campaign which preceded the election would insure polling of a heavy vote, but the contrary was true, however. The only part of the city where anywhere near like the side of the river, which went strictly in favor of Dr. Lane.

Except in the restricted districts of the city, known as the north end, where about 40 per cent of the registered vote was cast, the west side of the river only polled about 50 per cent.

The ordinance voted upon under the referendum law providing for the granting of franchise to the Automatic Telephone company, carried overwhelmingly.
