Reports from the wheat growing districts of the United States show promising conditions, indicating that the American farmers will have more wheat to sell this year than last. The crop is now estimated at 670,000,000 bushels which means great prosperity for American farmers and the whole country.

The whipping post law which was passed at the last session of the legislature was carried into effect last week when Charles McGinty was stripped and beaten without mercy. McGinty is evidently a brute, but this is no excuse for such a brutal law. Think of a human being being stripped to the waist with the blood streaming down his back from the cuts of a lash. Governor General Trepoff has begun his campaign against education on the ground it opens the eyes of the people to evil conditions and weakens the authority of the government, says a dispatch from St. Petersburg. The following article from the Pendleton East Oregonian contains a whole lot of good sense. It is a great mistake when people think that they are going to buy anything cheap in Portland during the fair. Prices have already been advanced about 25 per cent. The article follows:

Home merchants are helping you support the city and county governments, spending their incomes in your midst, helping build up your roads and streets and school facilities, and is it just for you to rush away with the impulse of the hour to carry your money to Portland for goods that can be bought cheaper at home?

Portland is the highest priced place in the entire Pacific Coast in which to trade this year, because it is the one opportunity of years to get outside money, and stocks of goods will be marked up to meet the rush of strangers.

It is enough to drain the channels of trade of the home counties in fares and expenses in going to the fair. It is estimated that 300 people went to Portland on Umatilla county day. A modest estimate of the expenses of each one is \$30 for the trip, making a total of \$9000 taken out of circulation on that one excursion.

Pelee Again in Eruption.

Port Defiance, Island of Martinique, June 12.—For the past few days Mount Pelee has manifested a recrudescence of activity which, while stronger than that of April of the present year, does not seem to be of an alarming nature. Some dense clouds of smoke have been discharged from the volcano and have slowly fallen over the White River Valley, afterwards disappearing on arrival at the sea coast. Sharp luminous flashes have been perceived at the dome of the mountain and a fairly strong burst of flame was seen between 1:40 and 2:10 on June 3.

On that day a very thick cloud of smoke almost descended to the sea and the cinders thrown up extended, to the village of Le Precheur, which is on the extreme line forming the limit of the territory devastated during the terrible outbreak of May, 1902, (resulting in the loss of about 40,000 lives) and then swept seaward and disappeared. After this the volcano again became calm and remained so until the night of June 10-11, during which the dome was illuminated by numerous luminous points.

The collapse of part of the dome occurred yesterday morning at 6 o'clock. It was accomplished by an outflow of mud into the White River Valley. At 11:30 the same morning a dense cloud of smoke slowly arose from the crater to the estimated height of about 1000 yards and extended toward Le Precheur, where the smoke was dissipated. Since then the volcano has remained calm.

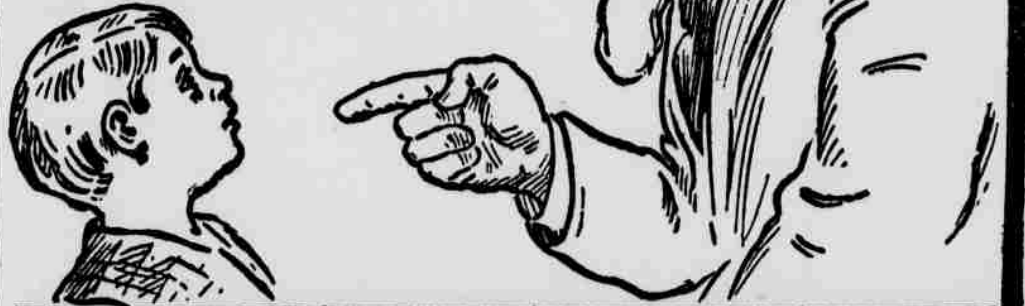
