COUNTY COURT

Number of Claims Against the
County Unusually Large
at This Term.

The regular term of the county court
was convened at the court house by
Judge T. W. Ayers on Wednesday of
last week with a full board present.

The attention of the court was oc-
cupied for three days. The number of
claims against the county was unusu-
ally large at this time. In all 277 bills
were audited, aggregating \$7,529.58 for
the county expense.

Petition of W. C. Lacy, et al, for es-
tablishment of county road. Not al-
lowed.

Petition of W. B. Parsons, et al, to
establish county road. Continued.

Petition of B. E. Pennington for
county road. Thos. Morgan and John
McCarty were appointed viewers to
meet with County Surveyor McGee to
view the road on Monday, July 17.

The appointment of Fred P. Mesick
as deputy county surveyor was con-
firmed.

The appointment of J. G. Crawford
as deputy county clerk was approved
by the court.

The application of the Farmers
Warehouse Co., of Ione, for warehouse
license was granted.

Application of Interior Warehouse
Co., of Ione, for warehouse license.
Granted.

Petition of George W. Chapin, et al,
for county road. Granted. The follow-
ing were allowed damages on account
of injury to premises by establishment
of road: John Eades, 1 1/4 miles three
wire fence; Fred Fisher, three-fourths
mile wire fence; J. B. Adams, one-half
mile, three wire fence; Mary E. Roysa,
damage on land and building fence,
\$20.

W. H. Akers having removed from
Justice district No. 3, Frank Akers was
appointed to fill the vacancy.

The court ordered \$20,000 insurance
to be taken out on the court house.

WANTED TO DIE

Wife Beater Oliver Goes Crazy and
Attempts Suicide in the
County Jail.

David Sherman Oliver, who was
confined in the county jail, charg-
ed with wife beating, attempted
to commit suicide by butting his
head against an iron pin attached
to a cell door, last Thursday.
Oliver was arrested last week
and being unable to furnish bonds
in the sum of \$500, was placed in
the county jail. At first he seem-
ed rational enough and was very
talkative to everyone that came
near, but after a few days' con-
finement commenced to get
gloomy in brooding over his
troubles. On Wednesday evening
he was more cheerful and stated
to Deputy Sheriff Hill that he in-
tended to plead guilty, having de-
cided that that was the easiest
way out of the difficulty. The
next morning he showed signs of
insanity and was so violent that
Sheriff Shutt became alarmed that
the man might do himself violent
injury, his actions showing sui-
cidal intent. He asked the Sheriff
for a revolver and said that he
wanted to shoot himself. He said
that he did not want to shoot any-
body else, but would quitely go
back into the jail and kill himself.
Drs. Higgs and Snider were sent
for and the man was examined as
to his sanity. He still kept ask-
ing for a gun and to see whether
he was playing the insanity dodge,
an empty revolver was handed to
him and he was cautioned to be
careful with the weapon. He
quickly grabbed the revolver and
without looking to see whether it
was loaded or not placed the
weapon to the side of his head
and pulled the trigger. He seemed
to be greatly disappointed that he
had been fooled.

On one of the cell doors about
18 inches from the floor there is a
short blunt rod that is used for a
handholt to slide the door back
and forth. Oliver's next move,
while no one was looking, was to
get back a few feet and take a

lunge at the bar. This he tried
three times each time striking the
bar with his head and making ugly
wounds. After making the third
jump he was found by Deputy
Sheriff Hill, lying in a pool of
blood and before the officer could
get to him he was up and prepar-
ing to make another jump. Three
long gashes were cut in his scalp
and there was one deep indenta-
tion in his skull.

The man was so badly injured
that he was taken to the Heppner
Sanitarium.

The asylum authorities were
notified and A. T. Edunson and F.
G. Peden, two attendants from the
asylum came up Friday evening.
In charge of the attendants Oliver
was taken to the Asylum Saturday.

The biggest nugget in the world, one
which contains ninety per cent silver
and weighs 397 pounds, is the striking
feature of Colorado's mineral display
in the Mines and Metallurgy building
at the Lewis and Clark Fair. The sil-
ver contained in the nugget, if counted,
would make 6,640 silver dollars. It
was taken from the famous Mollie Gib-
son mines at Aspen, Pitkin county.
This mine has produced silver and gold
worth \$14,000,000, and has another \$1,-
000,000 worth in sight.

The free illustrated lectures by Barry
Bulkeley, of Washington, D. C., which
are given every afternoon at four o'clock
in the Government building at the
Lewis and Clark Fair, are attracting
large audiences. Mr. Bulkeley speaks
eloquently on the wonders of the Yel-
lowstone National Park, and his lec-
ture is beautifully illustrated by colored
lantern slides.

In the Foreign Exhibits building at
the Lewis and Clark Exposition there
is a reproduction of Raphael's "Sistine
Madonnas," done entirely in needle-
work. The reproduction was done by
a young German girl, Fraulein Clara
Ripberger, and is considered the most
wonderful example of art needlework
ever created.
