MORROW CO. EXHIBIT.

One of Best in Agricultural Building at Fair.

"Their dishes is too clean, and I never saw a sheepherders' cook yet with a white apron. It should all be covered with grease."

Such are the criticisms to be heard daily around the Morrow County booth, where one corner of the Agricultural building has been devoted to a model sheep camp and farm residence. While the necessary amount of wholesome or unwholesome dirt may be absent, it is, nevertheless, a fact that those who know have no fault to find with the general plan of the camp as reproducing in a vivid and interesting manner the chief features of life on the sheep pastures. The Eastern visitor can and does get a better idea of the woolgrowing industry from a few minutes spent examining this miniature than from hours on unillustrated talk. If there is anything he does not know, the information is cheerfully provided by the attendants of the exhibit. Most of the exhibit, however, is self-explanatory, though everyone does not know that the figure enveloped up to its waist in a sack is supposed to represent a man tramping the fleeces into huge bales for shipment to the scouring mills.

Morrow County has, in addition, a fine exhibit of wools in all states, from the fleece and hide to the scoured product. One monster fleece, already a prizewinner, is 36 pounds in weight, coming from the flocks of J. A. Nunnamaker, while an average 12 pound fleece is shown by the Penland Livestock Company, which claims to produce 180,000 pounds of wool annually. Wheat is the other big staple displayed in the Morrow County exhibit, although there is a good showing of all the grains common to Oregon. In addition to the threshed grains there is a large amount of grain in the sheaf, some of it this year's crop. Alfalfa and other grasses, both native and tame, are shown, and a large display of fruit is expected to arrive in a few days. There is also a fine display of birds and stuffed animals from a collection made by Dr. E. R. Swinburne, of Morrow County. It includes a kangaroo rat, such as is not very often seen in Oregon. The Board of Commissioners of Mor-

row County, composed of Judge T W Ayers, W. G. McCarty and F. M. Griffin, supplied the funds for the exhibit. Henry Blackman has charge of the display at the Exposition, and was also active in its collection as were Frank Gilliam and J. A. Woolery. Mr. Woolery, a pioneer in the county, has prepared a booklet setting forth its resources, needs and attractions, which is distributed at the booth to those who inquire after the county and the opportunities for the settler in it.—Portland Telegram.

From Alaska to Siberia.

Chicago, July 6—Captain John J. Healy has arrived here from New York, where he has been securing endorsements for a railroad from Siberia to Alaska, where he goes with J. A. Wadell, chief engineer of the project, to lay out the proposed route. It is reported

that the czar will make a concession of eight miles on each side of the track of the projected railroad from Irkutsk to East Cape when the conditions have been complied with.

A \$250,000,000 company will be formed in this country in October, and the actual work of the road will commence next year. The plan is to build 40 miles of tunnel under the Bering strait. It will take five years to complete the road. Dawson will be the eastern terminus.

Paul Jones' Body Delivered.

Paris, July 6.—In the presence of the highest dignitaries of France diplomatic representatives of many foreign governments and civil and naval officials of the United States, the body of Admiral John Paul Jones was today formally delivered to the United States government. The ceremony was one combining impressive dignity with brilliant military and naval pomp in which the soldiers and sailors of France and the sailors of America united in tendering honors to the illustrious founder of the American navy.
