Rea and Mattison to Pen.

The supreme court hands down the following decision:

State of Oregon, respondent, vs. Albert H. Rea and Charles Mattison, appellants, from Morrow county, W. R. Ellis, Judge; affirmed opinion by Chief Justice Wolverton.

Albert Rea and Charles Mattison were convicted in the circuit court at Heppner for horse stealing and they were sentenced to three years each in the penitentiary by Judge Ellis. Sheriff Shatt left this morning to take charge of the men. Rea is at Monument and Mattison is at Sumpter.
