He was on his way to the Lewis and Clark fair where he has a contract with a show company. He intended to drive the goats to The Dalles and go from there by boat. The man stated that the goats were good for thirty miles a day on the road.

The Union Meat company of Portland will ship out a train load of beef cattle from Heppner about the 15th of this month. Most of the cattle will come from Grant county in the John Day country.

L. E. McBee, of Cecil, was in the city the fore part of the week. Mr. McBee states that he has sold 300 tons of alfalfa hay for \$6 per ton. Hay is in good demand and \$6 per ton is considered a good price for alfalfa. Paul Hiesler has also sold his grain hay for \$9 per ton which is also a big price.

J. H. Phirman, of The Dalles, was again in the city this week looking after a shipment of beef cattle to the Union Meat company of Portland. The shipment consisted of three cars and the cattle were purchased from L. D. Sweek, Ben Watkins and Pete Noble, of Grant county.

Judge Ayers informs the Gazette that the road which has been surveyed from the Finley place about 14 miles north of Heppner to Irrigon will be opened up as soon as practicable this fall. There will also be considerable work in the Ione country this fall as soon as the proper time comes for the working of roads. Every district in the county should receive a just proportion of road work.

Wm. Matlock returned Friday from Grant county where he has been in the John Day country buying beef cattle. Mr. Matlock purchased 80 head of fat steers. The animals were driven to this city Sunday and were shipped to the Union Meat company Monday. Mr. Matlock reports that cattle in the John Day country are now in good condition and that quite a number are being offered for sale.

The first three sacks that were threshed of C. D. Huston's crop were weighed and the sacks weighed 146, 145, 145 pounds respectively.

Upon complaint of Sam Meadows Joseph Bearman was arrested at Douglas last Saturday and brought to this city charged with the larceny of a horse from Mr. Meadows' livery stable. It seems that young Bearman hired a saddle horse at Meadows' stable on Monday of last week to go to Lexington. The horse was not returned and the matter ran on for several days. Mr. Meadows not being able to find the missing animal and learning that Bearman was at Douglas caused his arrest. The young man was given a hearing before Justice White Saturday. The evidence brought forth facts showing that instead of going to Lexington Bearman had gone to Ione and had turned the horse out in a pasture. Going to the telephone he had intended to call up Mr. Meadows and tell him where the horse was. Through a mistake of the phone a livery stable at Ione was called up and Bearman who thought he was talking to Meadows' stable told where the horse was and asked the liveryman to come and get the animal. The intent being not criminal Bearman was turned loose. The incident will probably be a good lesson to the young man.

KILLED BY TRAIN.

Tom Davidson of Ione Run Over By Cars.

Three coaches of the O. R. & N. on the main line at Heppner Junction passed over the right ankle of Tom Davidson, of Ione, Monday afternoon, and Mr. Davidson died from the effects of the terrible accident Tuesday morning at the Heppner Sanitarium.

Mr. Davidson was returning from Portland. Getting off of the train on the main line, he was apparently waiting to make the change of cars at Heppner Junction, but when the train on the main line started to pull out for the east, Mr. Davidson made a run and attempted to board it. He failed to get on the car and was thrown down by the force of the moving train. His right leg slipped under the wheels and was severed just above the ankle.

During the long wait before assistance could be rendered Mr. Davidson suffered a great loss of blood and was brought to the Heppner Sanitarium in a critical condition. He was given every attention possible at the Sanitarium, but never revived from the shock and died at a little after 8 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Mr. Davidson was well known in Morrow county, being a very successful stockman and farmer. He was one of the wealthiest men of the county and leaves a large estate.

Negro Desperado Slain.

Lewisville, Kan., Aug. 3.—After killing two persons, seriously and probably fatally shooting two others, and slightly wounding two more, Ike Kinney, a desperate negro, was killed in a star bottom at Doe's, six miles south of Lewisville, at noon today, after a hot fight with a posse of citizens that had surrounded him.

Kinney killed a negro at Stamps on Wednesday, fled, and, while being pursued by a posse, shot and killed E. L. Ferguson. As three o'clock this morning, three miles from Lewisville, the negro met Mr. and Mrs. Stewart, of Greensburg, and immediately began firing. After shooting and seriously wounding both, the negro told them that he thought they were members of a posse, and told them he was very sorry he had fired on them.

Later this morning about 25 men with dogs started on Kinney's trail. A few members of the searching party finally located Kinney in a bottom near Doe's plantation postoffice. As soon as the posse had arrived and began to close in on the negro he opened fire. C. F. Nash lost a finger. Alvin Barham was shot through the neck and seriously wounded. Then W. C. Nash sent a bullet into the negro and he tumbled over dead.

Fifteen hundred dollars had been offered for the capture of Kinney, dead or alive.
