

Oregon Irrigation Association.

Acting President Stephen A. Lowell, of the Oregon Irrigation Association, has sent out the following circular:

Dear Sir: The State of Oregon is especially honored by the assemblage within her borders of the National Irrigation Congress at a time when the subject of irrigation is receiving continent-wide attention. It is fitting that this state, most liberal contributor to the irrigation fund of the nation, shall be the scene of the most important session which the National Association has held, or is likely to hold.

The State Irrigation Association will hold no distinctive meeting, but will cooperate with the Lewis and Clark Exposition management and the city of Portland in welcoming the National organization, and furthering its work.

Mayor Frank Gilham, of Heppner, has been appointed as a member of the reception committee. Judge T. W. Ayers is a member of the executive committee.

Find Cure For Leprosy.

Manila, Aug. 12.—American surgeons, connected with the Board of Health of Manila, declare that they have discovered a positive cure for leprosy. Of 25 cases treated, all have improved, six cases being absolutely cured. Several patients, portions of whose bodies were gone, have recovered.

All of the cases have been under observation for at least six months, and it is absolutely impossible to discover a trace of the germ of the disease in the blood of the patients. The method used is a system of X-rays.

The surgeons do not desire their names to be mentioned at present. They will not ask for the rewards which have been offered by various governments for a cure for leprosy.

The official report of yellow fever at New Orleans up to 6 p. m. August 13, disclosed 963 cases of which 154, or just 16 per cent have resulted fatally.

At Ottumwa, Iowa, Mrs. Mary Harris has been arrested charged with the murder of her husband, who was found dead in bed, shot through the head.

Past Assistant Surgeon R. H. Von Eckloff, of the United States army, has been ordered from Colon to New Orleans. He is authority on all matters pertaining to yellow fever.

Chairman Shonts, of the Panama canal commission, states that just 30 cases of yellow fever have been reported on the isthmus during August, that there is no "scar" at all, and no indication of any epidemic from that disease.

Adam Boyer, at Berea, O., made many threats to kill his wife and nine children. He undertook to carry them out, and shot and killed his wife, and shot at and missed the three oldest children. He has fled and has not been captured.

February last a treasure box containing \$50,000 cash and securities amounting to \$250,000, was stolen from Herman S. Cheney, at Southbridge, Mass. August 13 the box was left at Mr. Cheney's office door, wrapped in soiled papers, and carefully tied, with all the contents intact. Not a dollar was missing.

Antelope Herald: It is reported that 1,000 head of sheep belonging to the Miller & Lux outfit of San Francisco, were killed in the Granite mining district of eastern Grant county recently. Warning had been sent to sheepowners to keep their sheep away from the mining property, as they were damaging the water supply and forage.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

Following is the report of the United States Department of Agriculture, Oregon section for the week ending Friday, August 15:

Dry weather continues and the need of rain is becoming more urgent. Streams are getting low and pasturage is becoming very short, except on tide land and on the mountain ranges. Stock, up to within a few days ago, kept in good condition, but now cattle are losing flesh except where they are helped by an extra feed of hay. The harvesting and the threshing of grain are being rapidly pushed and some farmers are through with this work.

Fall wheat and barley yields continue good. The straw of spring wheat was heavy and the heads were large, but the berry shriveled during the recent hot weather, with the result that the yields in nearly every section of the state are less than expected. Oats suffered similarly, and, while the damage was possibly not so great as in the case of spring wheat, oat yields are also disappointing.

Corn and late potatoes need rain; the hot days curl the corn leaves, but they freshen up again during the coolness of the nights. Hops are uneven, and reports regarding the condition of the crop are conflicting. Sugar beets in the Grand Ronde valley are promising, but the crop is not so good as it was last year at this time. Peaches are plentiful in the markets. Apples are smaller in size than usual, but otherwise the yield in the well kept orchards promises to be nearly an average one. Prunes have dropped more than usual at this season of the year.

Mrs. George Raes choked to death at Butte, Mont., by a piece of bacon rind getting into her windpipe as she laughed while eating her dinner.

The Booth-Kelly Lumber company will expend \$750,000 on betterments of its properties in Lane county, of which a portion will be expended upon new mills.

Idaho last year yielded 4,500,000 bushels of wheat. The yield this year is expected to be about the same as last, although the acreage is larger. The apparent discrepancy is due to hot winds.

At Moscow, Idaho, Odin B. Waller, his son, George Waller, and Arnt Borgen are under arrest charged with shooting the 13 year-old son of Alexander Anderson, July 14. The boy was not dangerously wounded and has recovered. Those who believe the accused did the shooting, which occurred after night, think they intended to kill the boy's father. A family feud is supposed to be at the bottom of the affray.
