

A BIG CATTLE DRIVE.

Over 3000 Head of Beef and Feeders on the Trail to the Railroad.

A large number of cattle are being driven from Grant county this week, and when the last of the bands now on the road reach the railroad, over 3000 head will have gone from this county to supply the demand for beef and feeders.

To Ontario are being driven 2050 head of three and four-year-old steers that have been contracted to residents of Malheur county and will be fed at the large alfalfa ranches near Ontario. Five cattlemen in the Isee country are interested in this big drive to the extent of the following number of head: Brown & Somerville, 500 head; Dave Magill, 350 head; H. H. Trowbridge, 600 head; John Laycock, Jr., and Ike Mills, 600 head.

In the direction of Pendleton are being driven 700 head, which will be delivered to R. N. Stanfield and will be fed at his large alfalfa ranch on Butter creek near Echo. In this lot is a band of 250 head of fat cows from Brown & Somerville, a band of 300 head of steers from J. J. Angell, and 150 head of steers from A. L. Dunaway, T. F. Dunten, and C. A. Gilbert.

Mr. Stanfield will also receive a band of cattle at Heppner, which band is now or soon will be, started to that point. In this band T. H. Brennon will have 150 head of steers and a mixed band of 200 head from Joseph Smith.

With the exception of several hundred head that have been purchased in different parts of Grant county by Dave Magill and Brown & Somerville, this large band of cattle are the product of the range of southern and southwestern part of Grant county, and represent the size band of beef and feeders sold each year by the cattlemen of that locality. The prices received by the cattlemen are \$2.75 per hundred weight for steers, and \$2.00 for cows, which price is an increase over the price offered two months ago.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

"Ben Hur" at Marquam Grand.

The scale of prices governing the engagement will be \$2.00 and \$2.50 on the lower floor and \$1.00, \$1.50 and \$2.00 in the balcony. All railroad lines entering Portland are to make low excursion rates, so by inquiring of the local railroad representative, full information concerning the same can be ascertained.

Echo Waterworks.

Echo has already let the contract for sinking a city well, for installing a gasoline engine and pump with which to pump city water and next Saturday night will let the contract for lining the city reservoir with cement, for laying the water pipes and completing the city water system, which will represent an expenditure of about \$5000 when completed.

About \$2500 in cash is now available for the purpose and it is thought the other \$2500 can be raised by public subscription, as it is not the desire of the city to issue bonds, if possible to prevent it.

The water system will be complete in every detail, with gasoline engine, cement lined reservoir located on the hill west of the town, to give it sufficient pressure for all purposes, and with mains leading to all portions of the town. The residents will almost entirely use city water, as it promises to be an excellent quality and will be supplied at very moderate rates, not exceeding \$1 per month for domestic purposes, it is thought. The well will be sunk to an indefinite depth, this depending altogether upon the quantity and quality of water found.—East Oregonian.

Crowd to See Pat Crowe.

Omsa, Oct. 10.—Pat Crowe was arraigned before Judge Berks in the Police Court today and pleaded not guilty to the charge of shooting with intent to kill Patrolman Jackson. The little police courtroom was crowded to its capacity when Crowe appeared. The charge was read and Crowe pleaded not guilty and was immediately taken back to the jail.

The preliminary hearing has been set for Wednesday, but Crowe's attorneys intimated that the hearing would be waived. A charge of highway robbery in connection with the Cudahy kidnapping will be filed in the county court tomorrow.

Crowe refuses to see the public and at his request nobody is admitted to his presence.

Awards Made to Oregon Counties.

The comparative standing of twenty-four Oregon counties in their competition for special awards offered by the state at the Lewis and Clark Exposition was made public Tuesday evening. The results of this competition and the awarding of prizes was made by an impartial jury composed of executive commissioners from outside the state. Their findings were presented at a banquet given last evening at the American Inn by the Lewis and Clark State Commission to the representatives of exhibiting counties.

In their work of passing upon the various county exhibits the special jury found competition so close and the showings made so uniformly excellent that it was necessary to split the awards. The prize of \$1000 for the best county exhibit was distributed among Marion, Coos, Umatilla, Linn, Wasco and Lane counties. The second award of \$500 was divided among Clackamas, Jackson, Columbia, Polk and Morrow counties. The third award of \$300 was divided among Benton, Yamhill, Malheur, Union and Baker counties. For the fourth award of \$200 there are seven claimants: Walla, Washington, Sherman, Josephine, Lincoln, Harney and Douglas counties.

The competition for the State Commission's special prizes has caused the participating counties to put their very best into their booths. The commission first offered to pay \$500 to each county making a creditable exhibit of its resources. This encouraged many counties to participate that otherwise might not have felt able to afford the luxury. Then came the prize awards as an incentive for a high standard of exhibit. Each one of the 25 counties that took part constructed their booths on elaborate lines and filled them with the best products obtainable. Each one also provided a

superintendent to remain in charge and distribute literature and information bearing on their counties to any and all visitors who wished such information. The outcome as announced last night indicates the zeal that has been exercised by the county representatives in their work.

Bandits held up and shot the paymaster of the Buena Vista mines, near Guadalajara, Mexico, and stole his funds, amounting to \$5000. Mounted police afterward killed 11 of the bandits and are searching for four more.
