WILLIAMSON SENTENCED

Commissioner Marion Biggs
Given Equal Penalty

GESNER GETS OFF LIGHTER

Appeals Are to Be Made and a
Stay of Execution Was
Granted.

John New'on Williamson, Congress-
man from Oregon for the Second Dis-
trict, was sentenced in the United
States Court this morning to serve 10
months' imprisonment and to pay a fine
of \$500 for conspiracy to suborn perjury
in connection with taking public lands.
Marion R. Biggs, United States Com-
missioner, was reprimanded by the
court for similar dereliction of duty and
given equal penalty, but because Dr.
Van Gesner, convicted of being a fellow
conspirator to suborn perjury, was old
and in feeble health, the term of im-
prisonment was cut in two and the fine
doubled.

Appeals are to be made, and a stay
of execution was made this morning,
pending a further order of the court.
Meanwhile Congressman Williamson
will go free on his own recognizance,
but a bond of \$400 each was required
of the other two defendants, the same
as during the trial of the case. As the
term of imprisonment is less than one
year, sentences would be served in the
county jail.

Severe Fighting in Southwest Africa.

Capetown, Oct. 12.—Morengo and
Morris, chiefs of the rebellious Hotten-
tots of German Southwest Africa, have
captured Jerusalem camp between
Wambad and Scuit drift, after severe
fighting, during which Lieut. Surmand
and five men were killed and eight men
wounded. The Hottentots sustained no
losses and captured all the stock and
stores.
Several Germans were made prisoners
but after being disarmed were allowed
to return to Lieut. Gen. von Trotha,
commander of the German forces, with
a letter from Morengo saying that the
Hottentots were now in a position to
take the offensive and would fight to
the finish.

The German garrison at Kilaats,
hearing that Morengo was in the vicin-
ity, burned their stores, deserted their
post and retired to Descondesdam. The
garrison Knaas has been strengthened
by 900 men and a battery of artillery.

Well Up in Education.

In the awards for the educational ex-
hibits at the Exposition the jury has set
a much higher standard than obtains in
any other department.

The educational awards are not all in
as yet, a few scattering exhibits remain-
ing to be considered, but enough is
known of the results to make it sure
that Oregon stands with the highest
in the showing made. Oregon's educa-
tional display is one of the largest and
most comprehensive, and from the
awards that have been made it is clear
that the state is second on the Coast
only to California, and has but one
other superior among the states repre-
sented in the educational exhibit—
Massachusetts. And these states excel
Oregon only in number of awards.
Oregon has won 19 gold medals, 24
silver medals, 13 bronze medals and
honorable mention in 11 cases.

WILL NOT INSPECT CATTLE.

Oregon Stock Free From Disease
Says Dr. M. S. Lantz.

No inspection will be made of cattle
shipped from this state to others, from
this time on, and Dr. M. S. Lantz says
that the secretary of agriculture has is-
sued an order to that effect.

This order has been issued on account
of the lack of disease found in stock in
Oregon and Washington and will affect
both states. This, of course, is an ex-
periment, but all cattle will be in-
spected at the markets and if any dis-
ease is found the old inspection order
will be put into effect again.

Cattlemen are pleased at this order,
it doing away with a great deal of un-
necessary bother which has been heretofore experienced.

New Governor For Philippines.

Washington, Oct. 12.—By reason of
what appears to be dissatisfaction in
the Philippines, Luke E. Wright, Gov-
ernor-General of the Philippines and
president of the Philippine Commission,
will retire from that position about De-
cember 1. General Wright is expected
to arrive in the United States during
that month, and is entitled to six
months' leave of absence prior to the
formal relinquishment of his labors as
Governor-General. It is understood
that he expects to return to Memphis,
Tenn., to resume the practice of law.

President Roosevelt and Secretary
Taft have, it is thought, decided upon
the selection of a successor to Governor
Wright, but no information is allowed
to become public as to his identity. It
can be stated, reasonably definitely
that he will be a man not now connected
with the commission.

Governor Wright and Mrs. Wright, it
is said, have not been thoroughly satis-
fied with their environments in the
Philippines. Recently General Wright
has not been in perfect accord with
some of the plans proposed for the bene-
fit of the islands, but it cannot be said
at this time that that is the reason for
his retirement.

It is said that it was evident to those
who accompanied Secretary Taft to the
Philippines that General Wright was
not satisfactorily situated in Manila,
and to some of the party the news of
his retirement does not come as a sur-
prise.

Yellow Dog Fund For Bribery.

New York, Oct. 12.—Among the things
upon which President McCurdy of the
Mutual Life will be interrogated when
he resumes the witness stand before the
legislative committee will be a story
which reached the ears of Chief Inquisi-
tor Hughes today to the effect that in
the winter, the Mutual Life maintains a
house at Albany, where it offers sumptu-
ous entertainment to various legisla-
tors, whose friendship it is desirable to
retain.

Hughes is informed that a chef is sent
up to look after the culinary department
of the Mutual's headquarters, whenever
the Mutual's representatives had occa-
sion to invite legislators to luncheon, and
the quality of the fare was sure to be of
the best.

It is also asserted that upon close ex-
amination it might be found that certain
legislators who scorn to sell a vote, are
not averse to winning at cards, and that
some of the "yellow dog" fund, is prop-
erly itemized, will disclose some hand-
some winnings by legislators, with cor-
responding losses by the Mutual, Equi-
table and New York Life fund for fighting
iniquitous legislation.

Hughes may also try to throw some
light on the wine cellar which the Mu-
tual is said to maintain.

BIG FAIR THING OF PAST

Portland Turned Out to Pay
Last Farewell

BIG CROWDS AT THE LAST

The Exposition Was a Big Success
When Looked at from Any
Standpoint.

The Lewis and Clark Centennial Ex-
position is ended. Its imposing pal-
aces and buildings will come down; its
well-groomed terraces and lawns will
quickly fade to harmonize once more
with the rugged landscape. But its in-
fluences for the betterment of a new
country will live on forever.

It ran its course on a chalk mark of
success and ended in a burst of glory.
From a financial standpoint it was a
success; from a commercial standpoint
it was a success; from an artistic stand-
point it was a success. Look at the
Portland Exposition from any stand-
point you will, and all you see is suc-
cess.

Portland turned out to pay a last
farewell even as Portland has turned
out from the first day in support of its
great enterprise. From all over the
state came the throngs to witness the
end; and every point on the Coast was
represented in the vast multitude that
flooded the grounds from morning until
well into the next morning. It was a
gathering second only in proportions to
that which assembled on Portland's
own day. There were little more than
half as many people there on opening
day, for the Exposition did not mean so
much then. It had not become endeared
to all by pleasant associations—by a
realization of its vast importance in the
development of an empire on the Pa-
cific.

The end came at midnight, with a
scene that words can but poorly de-
scribe. Although a heavy rain was
falling, thousands stood the wetting and
waited for the vital hour. At ten min-
utes of the hour President H. W. Goode,
Governor Chamberlain, Mayor Lane
and a large party of prominent citizens
and Exposition officials entered the
bandstand on Gray's boulevard. The
band played a medley of patriotic
American airs, which brought forth pro-
longed volleys of cheering. Then Gov-
ernor Chamberlain was introduced. In
a few well-directed words he congrat-
ulated the people of Portland and of the
Coast for the great success they had
achieved, and in passing, eulogized
President Goode and those who had
been actively interested in shaping the
destinies of the Exposition. Mayor
Lane spoke in a similar vein, and ex-
pressed particular delight in the fact
that the Fair should end in the midst of
a good old Oregon rainstorm.

Then there came a pause, a breathless
pause, during which there was a nervous
consulting of watches. The life of the
great Exposition was swiftly ebbing
away.

President Goode arose slowly to pro-
claim the end. It was ten seconds
away. "The greatest honor that has
ever come into my life or that ever will
be that of declaring this Exposition
open," he said; "I now officially de-
clare the Lewis and Clark Centennial
Exposition at an end."

Contract For Seven Miles.

Klamath Falls, Or., Oct. 12.—The
contract for grading seven more miles
of the California-Northeastern Railroad
(formerly the Weed Railroad) from its
present terminus this way has been let
to E. B. and A. L. Stone, of Oakland,
Cal., and is to be completed ready for
the ties and rails within 60 days.

This information was brought to town
yesterday by A. H. Nafziger, of the
Klamath Development Company, who
has just returned from Southern Cali-
fornia.

Work beyond the terminus of the con-
tract just let will be commenced as soon
as the specifications are ready and as
fast as the roadbed is completed the ties
and rails are to be laid and the road
pushed to its designation—Klamath
Falls—as rapidly as a large force of men
can do the work.

Fuel Oil for Oregon Engines.

Harriman lines in Oregon will soon be
fully equipped for the use of oil as lo-
comotive fuel instead of coal. Immense
tanks, each with a capacity for 30,000
barrels of crude oil will be erected at
The Dalles and Heppner on the O. R. &
N, and tanks of 5000 barrels capacity at
Arlington, Heppner Junction and at
Albina, the latter to supply engines of
both roads. South of Portland a tank
of 55,000 barrels capacity will be erected
at Roseburg, one of the 30,000 capacity
at Grant's Pass and another of the same
size at Junction City. At Whiteson a
tank will be built of 15,000 barrels ca-
pacity and smaller structures holding
5000 barrels each at Albany and Spring-
field.

Firebug Sets Tenements Ablaze.

New York, Oct. 13.—Brooklyn is
aroused as never before by the unparal-
leled boldness of a firebug, who, going
about in an automobile, in seven hours
set fire to eight crowded tenement houses
causing scenes of wild excitement among
the hundreds of families, several of
whose members were carried out uncon-
scious by fire escapes.

The incendiary worked with such
boldness that there is absolutely no
doubt of his identity. The only solution
of his strange conduct is that he is vi-
ciously insane and delights in seeing
fires. The most serious fire yesterday
started at 3:50 o'clock in the afternoon
on Flushing avenue. It spread to two
tenement-houses, causing a total damage
of \$12,000. In several instances tenants
in various tenements had narrow es-
capes. There were many thrilling res-
cues by firemen.
