

COLONIST TRAVEL IS HEAVY.

One-Way Rates Attracting Many Homeseekers.

Results of the advertising done for Oregon by the Lewis and Clark Fair are already beginning to make themselves felt through the increased number of homeseekers that are coming into the state. The special colonists' rates which are in force from Eastern points to the Pacific Coast are bringing to Oregon every week thousands of people, the great majority of whom are seeking to invest money and will remain as permanent residents. General Passenger Agent A. L. Craig, of the Harriman lines, stated yesterday that more than 2000 holders of colonists' tickets are arriving at Oregon points each week over the O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific.

All transcontinental roads began selling the special colonists' tickets September 15 and will continue the low rates until October 31. The rate is \$33 from Chicago, \$30 from St. Louis and \$25 from St. Paul. The number of tickets sold by all roads is in excess of the number sold while the colonists' rates were in force last year or during the Spring months this year. A small proportion of those coming are visitors who intend to return to the bulk of such people took advantage of the cheap round trip rates to the Exposition. Some of those who come are locating in the cities, but the majority are farmers who will buy land in the Willamette Valley and other sections of the state.

This increased travel is looked upon as the direct result of the Fair. Many of those who are coming attended the Exposition early in the season and returned to sell their property in the East before locating here permanently. Others are being drawn to Oregon by the favorable reports given out by those who have returned East after visiting the Pacific Coast.

GERMANS EAT DOG AND RABBIT.

Beef and Mutton Rise Above Reach of the People.

Berlin, Oct. 12.—There is much evidence to show that Germany's meat famine is growing worse. At Eisen a conference of the municipalities in the region decided to establish regular rabbit markets and in the municipal public markets rabbit sections have been established. Since horseflesh has risen in price and dog flesh is no longer obtainable, a number of municipalities began buying carloads of sea fish at the coast towns and selling them at cost to citizens. This expedient was first adopted at Salingen, but has now spread to various Westphalian cities, to Posen, and even to Bavarian towns.

The latest government statistics show that the price of meat is still rising. The September report shows that some kinds rose during the month a cent and a half a pound.

At a conference between the burgomasters of Berlin and other important towns it was voted to appeal to Prince von Bulow, the imperial chancellor, to take measures to alleviate conditions, since previous petitions made to Prussian Minister of Agriculture Podbielski had been unavailing.

Fierce Fight on High Seas.

Washington, Oct. 13.—The murder of Captain Rumill and four of the crew of the four-masted schooner Harry A. Berwind, in a mutiny while the vessel was bound from Mobile to Philadelphia, is the story told in a special to the Star from Southport tonight. The schooner Blanche King put into port this evening bringing in three negroes, all that remained of the crew of the Berwind. The captain, mate and engineer were apparently murdered and their bodies thrown overboard; the body of the fourth sailor, a negro, was found on the deck, where he had been killed.

It develops from the story of the negroes that the mutiny arose as a result of a quarrel about the coffee. The deck of the Berwind was found covered with blood, giving evidence of a fierce fight. The mate's berth was spotted with blood indicating he was butchered in bed. After the searching party placed the negroes in irons, one complained the irons were too tight. When they were loosed the negro whipped out a pistol and shot one of his shipmates dead, the presumption being he signalled the King against the will of the others.

FOOL MADE A FOOL OF PUBLIC.

Frank Johnson Makes Fake Purchase of Wool Clip.

"It was all a big joke and I thought so at the time, but others did not," said Miles Lee, the large sheep grower and woolman of Lake City, referring to the report made yesterday that Frank Johnson, the Boston buyer, had paid him a \$2500 check in advance on an option at the price of 22 cents a pound for his 1906 wool clip.

Johnson made the contract all right, signed and executed it and handed it to me with the check. I was dubious about it at the time and thought there must be some joke in it and when he came around a few hours later and asked me to give the check back of course I knew I was right. I gave the papers back to Johnson as I agree with him that the 1906 clip will not open higher than 16 cents. Johnson explained to me that he was simply teasing a man in the hotel who was bothering him and he knew he could depend on me to return the papers if requested to do so. I might have turned it to Johnson a million pounds of wool instead of 1906. Just the same price will be good next season, in my judgment. I am sorry the incident got abroad but cannot blame anybody as there were half a dozen witnesses to the transaction."—Baker City Democrat.

Greeks Remain Quiet.

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 12.—Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer arrived here this morning and approved the action of Judge Thompson in calling upon the militia. The guards experienced no inconvenience during the night and the Greeks are making no complaints, but are resting easy.

Coroner's jury is now in session, but will not return a verdict until late this afternoon.

Grand jury began investigation of the Greek case this afternoon at 1 o'clock. The locomotive in which the engineer and fireman and the superintendent and foreman of the construction took shelter from the gang of Greek laborers that revolted at Glenbrook, Tuesday, was brought to Grant's Pass and taken south for repairs at the carshops.

The engine was badly riddled with bullets. The windows of the cab were shot out and the tank of the tender punctured. Bullet marks and scratches are in evidence over all parts of the locomotive. Only the protection of the iron-cased walls of the cab saved the whit men from death.

The gang of 200 Greeks comprised the construction and steel crew on the mountain division of the Southern Pacific between this city and Roseburg and recently gave much trouble because of their disorderly outbreaks. They have a curious and almost barbarous custom of feasting about twice each month. These feast days, or nights, are orgies of the most passionate sort, and compare very favorably with the "ghost" and "snake" dances of the American Indians.

In preparation for these feasts one or two of the crew are sent to town to purchase the beer and mutton. The beer is bought by the keg and mutton is taken alive. Frequently as many as 20 sheep are bought and consumed at a single feast. The kegs of beer are put on tap and every man imbibes as freely as he likes. The sheep selected for the slaughter are first driven frantically around camp.

Kansas Backs the President.

Washington, Oct. 13.—Railroad legislation and the oil situation, with special reference to the Middle West field, were discussed today by the President and Representative Campbell of Kansas. Mr. Campbell talked briefly of railroad rates and of the contest between the State of Kansas and the oil companies. He assured the President that the people of Kansas stood squarely at his back on the question of railroad rate legislation and there was no doubt he would have the unqualified support of the Kansas Congressional delegation.

MYSTERY OF THE WOODS

Woman's Clothing Found in the Mountains.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 13.—In a lonely spot in the mountains in the Salmon river country, E. Ellsworth, a well-known merchant of this place, found a quantity of women's apparel, indicating that some woman was lost in that vicinity about five years ago. While hunting far away from any human habitation and removed at a long distance from any trail, Mr. Ellsworth came upon a silk waist hanging to a bush.

A few feet farther along the hunter came upon a handkerchief and then a valise. Scattered about were a folded canvas tarpaulin, a folded blanket, a plush sofa pillow and a pair of red house slippers. A dress of red and white percale was torn to fragments, as though by a wild beast.

On opening the valise, a quantity of women's clothing of more than ordinary fineness was disclosed, with manicure set and other feminine belongings. A Libon bottle of perfume showed a Spokane dealer's name.

Mr. Ellsworth, who has hunted over this section for years, says he cannot conceive how a woman could have reached this spot, in a rough, broken country. It is 40 miles to the nearest ranch house with no trail from that direction. Some of the articles from the valise are on exhibition in a Boise store window.

Birth Rate Increases.

Do you know that the babies on your block have increased 75 per cent in the last five years?

Seventy-five per cent! Why it makes the talk of race-suicides sound like the jimmings of a feeble-minded phonograph.

The figures are on file in the Health Office, where is set down in black and white, the statement that since 1900 the birthrate in Portland has increased that number.

Here are some figures that will interest the world: In 1900, 1051 children were born in Portland; 1901, 1156; 1902, 1199; 1903, 1343; 1904, 1639—and for the first eight months of 1905, 1345, which was greater than for any entire year up to last. If for the remainder of this year the ratio is maintained, the grand total of new babes for 1905 will be 1753. And those who have watched the habits of the stork say he is busiest in the winter months.

The showing made by Portland is encouraging, but the people say it could be improved on. If the state census is correct, there will be born in Portland this year one child for every 63 persons, which on the common basis of five people to a family, means about one child a year to each, or about 16 to every 1000 people.

The National average is 27.2; in New York City it is 26 to every 1000 people, which is a good deal ahead of Portland, but this city makes a much better showing than San Francisco, which is a constant booster on population, and is very little behind St. Louis, whose papers give more space to a birth than they do to a speech by Governor Folk.

Portland's growth in the past five years has been 22 per cent; the increase in the birthrate is over three times that in general population.
