About 130,000 sheep have been sold out of Lake county this year. That means an income of over \$300,000, or about \$132 for every man, woman and child in Lake county. The wool clip last spring brought in a sum nearly as large.

The Oregonian says that R. N. Stanfield, of Butter creek, will feed 7000 head of beef cattle this winter. If Mr. Stanfield knew this he would be considerably alarmed over the feed situation. The actual number to be fed by Mr. Stanfield this winter will be about 600.

L. Sweek and wife and Mrs. C. N. Wilson returned from a trip to Heppner Sunday. Mr. Sweek reports having sold a band of 1400 ewes to G. B. Hufford of Butter creek, for \$4 per head. Mr. Hufford arrived in town Tuesday to receive the sheep. Gold mine is not in it with the sheepmen these days.—Monument Enterprise.

Lee Matlock, Ben Patterson and Waldon Rhea came up Saturday evening from Arlington, where they had been on a big goose shoot. The boys brought back 49 geese and report having had a fine shoot. Geese have congregated along the Columbia river by the million. As it is against the law to shoot on the river, the hunters get on top of the bluffs where they get under cover and wait for the birds to come near them on their flight to the feeding grounds. The geese are now feeding in the wheat fields around Arlington and in their flight to and from the feeding grounds makes ideal shooting.

The need of stock improvement is stimulating Morrow county stockmen in the purchase of better stock. One of the finest horses ever brought to Morrow county was purchased this week by Moreland Bros., of Hardman. This fine animal came from the well known importers, A. C. Ruby & Co., of Pendleton. This horse, Griffon, No. 42607, is a gray percheron and weighs 1875 pounds, the purchase price being \$3200. H. R. McCollom, representing Messrs. Ruby & Co., said to the Gazette in speaking of this horse: 'You will be safe in saying that this is the finest 3-year-old in the Northwest.'

Dan O'Leary lost the index finger of his right hand last Thursday by being kicked by a horse. Mr. O'Leary had been working the horse which was considered gentle, for some time out at the P. L. & L. Co.'s ranch. Early Thursday morning he stepped into the stall with a pan of feed in his hand and without any warning the horse kicked him, striking him on the hand. His hand was thrown against the side of the stall with such force and in such a manner that the sharp edge of the pan severed the finger. Two of the other fingers on the same hand were badly crushed. The injured man came to town and his hand was dressed by Dr. Winnard.

A GOOD START.

Commercial Club Building Committee Soliciting Funds.

There was a short meeting of the Heppner Commercial Club last Saturday evening at the council chamber.

The meeting was for the purpose of hearing a report from the building committee which was appointed to solicit subscriptions of stock for the building of a club house. Owing to a pressure of other business the committee reported that the time had been too short to do the work of soliciting and asked for an extension of time which was granted for another week.

The par value of each share is \$10 and the petition specifies that the stock is payable after the corporation has secured from the city of Heppner a lease on the real property on which the building is to stand for a term of 99 years. If the necessary stock can be secured there will not likely be any trouble to get the lease from the city council.
