Irrigation On John Day.

Carl Wagner, one of the progressive stockmen of near Spray, was in town yesterday on business. Mr. Wagner stated to the Enterprise that the dam across the John Day river above Spray is nearing completion, at the present the force is installing the head gates on each side of the river where the canals will be taken out. In speaking of the cost of the dam, Mr. Wagner states that it will cost from \$800 to \$900 more than was anticipated, reason for this is that the dam will be 14 feet high instead of 12 feet as was first planned. The dam will be completed by December 1st. The citizens along the river are anxiously awaiting the completion of this dam, and should it prove a success numerous other dams will be built on the North Fork and Main John Day rivers. Another year will see the vast area of fertile land along these rivers, which now is practically worthless, producing thousands of tons of alfalfa. We understand that William Allen, who is superintending the building of this dam, has already received proposals of three other dams on these rivers. Mr. Wagner states that stock are looking fine.—Monument Enterprise.
