DIED.

MINOR—In this city Monday evening, November 20, 1905, Ellis Minor, aged 73 years.

Mr. Minor's sudden death came as a great surprise to the people of Heppner. He had been out on the street on the day of his death and was apparently enjoying his usual health. Sitting at his home in the evening, Mrs. Minor heard him make a slight sound, and going to his chair found that he was dying.

Mr. Minor was a well known pioneer resident of Heppner and Morrow county. He was a familiar figure on the streets and was a man with many friends.

Ellis Minor was born June 1, 1832, in Green county, Pa., going to Iowa in 1858, he was married to Miss Anne M. Hill. In 1863, he went to the state of Illinois, and from there back to Iowa, starting across the plains to Oregon in 1864. After a long and tedious six months' trip of crossing the plains, Mr. Minor settled near Gervais in Marion county.

In the spring of 1871, Mr. Minor came to Morrow county and lived on what is now the Henry Gay place on Rhea creek, until '77 when he moved to Heppner, where he was engaged in the hotel business, butcher shop and livery stable. About 12 years ago he retired from business.

Deceased leaves a wife and the following children:

W. O. and C. A. Minor, of Heppner; Mrs. Ella Dodson, of Beigham, Wash.; Mrs. Delia Hullock, Mrs. Etta Roberts and Mrs. Ada Irwin, of Heppner, and Mrs. Nina Potter, of Spray.

The funeral will be conducted at the Heppner cemetery today.

MRS. W. J. HERREN DIES.

Pioneer Woman Passes Away at Her Home in Salem.

Mrs. W. J. Herren, one of the earliest pioneers of this state, died at her home in Salem at 3:15 Friday morning, after an illness lasting about three weeks. She was born at Liberty, Clay County, Mo., September 22, 1830. In 1845 she accompanied her parents across the plains, enduring the usual amount of hardships while en route, and settled that year at French Prairie, near Salem. Two years later she was married to W. J. Herren, who afterward became prominently identified with the political and commercial interests of that section. He has been dead several years.

Mrs. Herren bore a most exemplary character, and was much beloved in the community where she resided so long. She left five sons, 11 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. The surviving children are: David A. and Willard Herren, of Heppner; Albert Herren, of Salem; George Herren, of Portland, and Edward Herren, of Aurora, Or.

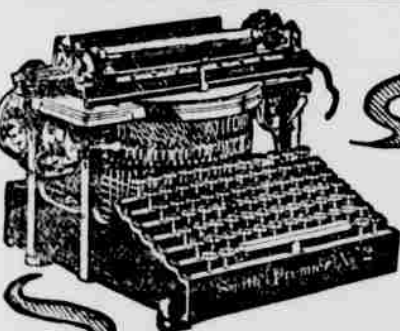
Election Notice.
