

WOLVERTON AND HAILEY.

It Is Said Fortune Has New Honors in Store For Them.

Governor Chamberlain thinks that President Roosevelt will name the successor to Judge C. B. Bellinger, of the United States Circuit Court, very soon after the arrival of Senator Fulton in Washington, and that Chief Justice of the Supreme Court C. E. Wolverton will get the place. It is quite likely that Judge T. G. Hailey, of Portland, will be the Governor's choice to fill the unexpired term of Judge Wolverton.

The Governor's prediction may be relied on, as it has indirect corroboration from another and equally authoritative source.

The belief that Judge Hailey will be raised to the state bench is founded on a quiet tip from an authority which is close to the Governor; but the latter would neither affirm nor deny the story.

Governor Chamberlain came down from Salem yesterday afternoon, to remain over Sunday, and to see his aged mother off for her home in Mississippi, after an extended visit to her son in Portland. When asked his opinion as to the Federal Judgeship appointment, the Governor said:

"I have no doubt the President will name Judge Wolverton."

"In that event, whom will you appoint to succeed Judge Wolverton?"

"I am not prepared as yet to answer that question," was his reply.

"How about the rumor that you are inclined to favor Judge Hailey, of Portland?"

"Well, I have always looked upon Judge Hailey as a capable man for the place, and there are others who may be just as capable and are candidates for the position, but I am not holding out any encouragement to any of them."—Portland Telegram.

Harvest Finished in Palouse.

Garfield, Wash., Nov. 17.—This week will wind up the threshing for the season, and 100,000 sacks of wet wheat, worth \$100,000 to the grower, has been saved since the rain ceased falling some two weeks ago. The Crisp brothers, who threshed in the vicinity of Garfield, and Steptoe Butte 14 days after the rain stopped coming down in torrents, have finished today, and in an interview Abraham Crisp said:

"We have threshed with two of our machines 14,000 sacks of grain, mostly wheat, that the farmers are selling readily for 50 and 51 cents a bushel, or \$1 per sack. In the locality where we have been threshing since the rain there have been several other machines, all doing good work. We have saved the farmers in the past two weeks not less than \$14,000, and it is conservative to say that not less than 100,000 sacks of grain, worth not less than \$100,000 have been saved to the farmers throughout the Palouse country the past 14 days.

"The farmers here got discouraged after the rain, and supposing their grain was all ruined, many of them sold in shock to cattlemen for whatever they were offered. James Haun, a prosperous farmer living near Elberton, sold 40 acres of wet wheat for \$40 cash. After

the rains ceased and clear weather came on the purchaser threshed part of the crop and got 400 sacks of fair wheat, which he readily sold for 51 cents per bushel, receiving in cash nearly \$650. A. Johnson, a farmer near Garfield, sold 55 acres of shocked wheat while the rain was falling for a cash consideration of \$153. Our machines threshed for the purchaser 1200 sacks of wheat, that sold readily for 50 cents per bushel, or about \$1300 cash."

Hill Raises Money.

New York, Nov. 17.—It was learned today that James J. Hill succeeded in two days in London in securing the financial backing he desired for his Western and Southwestern extensions, and that he will return home at once, prepared to go ahead with the plans he has in mind. It will be remembered that he left for Europe very suddenly three weeks ago, after E. H. Harriman had announced that we were entering a period of competitive railroad building.

It is believed that the financial requirements of Mr. Hill were not large, inasmuch as the recent issue of \$25,000,000 of Great Northern stock will go a long way toward financing the schemes in mind. One reason why he went to London to borrow money was that rates here were high, and he seemed to be able to make better terms abroad.

There is very little doubt that part of Mr. Hill's plan is to annex the Missouri, Kansas & Texas to the Burlington and so give a Gulf outlet to the Northwestern part of the system.

Hearst's Campaign Expenses.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 17.—William R. Hearst, candidate for Mayor of New York on the Municipal Ownership ticket, certified to the Secretary of State today that his total campaign expenses were \$65,843. This breaks the record for such expenses, which was formerly held by Governor Higgins, who spent during the last state campaign \$22,000. Mr. Hearst says that he contributed all but \$17,488 of the \$80,206 which was spent by the finance committee of the Municipal Ownership League for the benefit of all the candidates on the ticket.
