SHEEP KING TO ABDICATE.

New Firm to Buy Immense Estate of Charles Cunningham.

Pendleton, Nov. 24.—For a month past an option on all and excepting the city property in Pendleton owned by Charles Cunningham, the sheep king of Eastern Oregon, and all sheep owned by him have been held by Hen. J. N. Burgess, of Antelope; J. M. Keeney, of Shaniko; R. A. Kelsey, of Ontario, and Mrs. D. J. Mala key, of Portland. Rumor of the pending deal was heard upon the streets yesterday, and was confirmed last night by the three men interested when interviewed. Even now the abstracts of title and other legal matters are in the hands of two local law firms, Carter & Raley and Phelps & McCourt.

On December 1 the transfer will be made which will consummate the deal between the purchasers, who are incorporated under the firm name of the Cunningham Sheep & Land Company and Charles Cunningham for 20,000 head of the finest sheep in the West and 20,000 acres of land. The consideration in the deal is kept secret by the people interested. Although the actual sale has not taken place, there is no doubt that it will occur on the date mentioned, for as Mr. Keeney said last night, "We have too much money tied up in the option to make it probable that we will change our minds about buying the sheep and land."

When the deal is made the headquarters of the new firm will be made at Pilot Rock, and Messrs. Burgess & Kelsey will move to that place to make their homes. The management of the company will devolve upon these two men, both of whom are experienced shepherds. Mr. Burgess said last night, that as soon as they took charge of the Cunningham interests the sheep would be graded and only the highest-grade rams be purchased, it being their intention to raise the finest sheep in the West.

It was rumored that Mr. Cunningham would move to Arizona after having disposed of his interests here, where he would establish another "kingdom" and raise sheep. This story was denied by Mr. Burgess last night, who said he understood that the "sheep king" was going to retire and settle in this city.

Jury Says Not Guilty.

Emmet Cochran, one of our most progressive stockmen and highly respected citizen, had no trouble in proving his innocence in the circuit court at Canyon City, from the charged lodge against him.

Ever since the charge was preferred against Mr. Cochran, it has been the general concession of the people acquainted with the circumstances, that it was malicious and had no foundation whatever. This fact is substantiated by the twelve level headed men who sat in the jury box Monday and Tuesday listening and carefully weighing every word of the evidence produced, and after a deliberation of 15 minutes brought in a verdict of "not guilty."

It will be remembered that this case was instituted by W. A. Sweck in Justice Rea's court in this city last March, where he alleged that Mr. Cochran killed a roan cow which he reserved from a band of mixed cattle that he sold to Mr. Cochran previous to this. It is understood there were a number of roan cows in the bunch purchased.—Monument Enterprise.

REFUSES TO CHANGE.

Hitchcock Admits California Shares in Klamath.

Washington, Nov. 24.—Secretary Hitchcock is now convinced of the interstate character of the Klamath irrigation project and acknowledges that California is to benefit by the work in contemplation to fully as great an extent as Oregon, but he is not willing to change his order charging the entire allotment to the State of Oregon.

When Senator Fulton again took up the matter of the Umatilla project with the Secretary, he found Hitchcock holding the same views he voiced on the occasion of his previous visits, contending that Oregon's 51 per cent reserve fund has been appropriated and explaining that there are no funds available for construction of the Umatilla project.

Mr. Fulton maintains that, even if the Secretary adheres to his determination to charge the entire cost of the Klamath work to Oregon, there is yet enough money in the reclamation fund to the credit of Oregon to build the Umatilla project. On June 30 last Oregon's restricted fund was practically \$2,500,000. Deducting \$2,000,000 allotted for Klamath, there was yet \$500,000 left, and it is Mr. Fulton's contention that since July 1, 1905, enough money has been received from disposal of public lands in Oregon to make the other \$500,000 necessary for the Umatilla project. The Secretary is unable to state how much Oregon has contributed to the fund since July, but will advise the Senator when he ascertains the facts.

Notwithstanding that he denominates the Malheur project a "steal," and alludes to the operation of the wagon road people as a "graft," the Secretary will not formally set aside this project, though admitting that he will not construct it. Nor will he permit the Malheur allotment to be used in part for the Umatilla project. He says Oregon has had its full share of reclamation money outside of the Malheur project, and is not entitled to the benefit of the money which is now credited to that project but which is not being used.

A GREAT HARVEST.

Secretary Wilson Presents Vast Figures in Report.

Washington, Nov. 26.—"Wealth production on the farms of the United States in 1905 reached the highest amount ever attained in this or any other country—\$6,415,000,000."

In the first annual report of his third term Secretary of Agriculture Wilson presents an array of figures and a statement representing products and profits of the farmers of this country, which he admits "dreams of wealth production could hardly equal."

Four crops make new high records as to value—corn, hay, wheat and rice—although in amount of production the corn is the only one that exceeds previous yields. In every crop the general level of production was high and that of prices still higher. Besides the enormous yield of wealth the Secretary estimates that the farms of the country have increased in value during the past five years to a present aggregate of \$6,133,000,000.

"Every sunset during the past five years," he says, "has registered an increase of \$3,400,000 in the value of the farms of this country."

This increased value, the Secretary suggests, is invested better than in bank deposits or even in the gilt-edged bonds of private corporations.

Analyzing the principal crops for the year the Secretary says that corn reached its highest production at 2,708,000,000 bushels, a gain of 42,000,000 over the next highest year, 1899; hay is second in order of value, although cotton held second place during the two preceding years. The hay crop this year is valued at \$605,000,000. Cotton comes third, with a valuation of \$575,000,000; wheat, \$525,000,000; oats, \$282,000,000; potatoes, \$138,000,000; barley, \$58,000,000; tobacco, \$12,000,000; sugar cane and sugar beets, \$50,000,000; rice, \$13,982,000; dairy products, \$50,000,000, an increase of \$54,000,000 over last year.

American Goods to Canada.

Washington, Nov. 26.—The United States sold to Canada last year exports to the value of \$166,000,000. This amount constitutes more than 62 per cent of the whole Canadian imports and it was only 11 per cent of the exports of the United States. This statement is contained in a report to Charles M. Pepper, special agent of the Department of Commerce and Labor, resulting from his study of Dominion trade conditions.

Besides selling goods to Canada, Mr. Pepper says that 25,000 settlers went from the United States to its Northern neighbor from January to October, 1905, and that the value of their effects was \$10,000,000. This number of emigrants from the United States is less than for the two previous years. The new wheat fields of the Dominion's great Northwest are the attraction to those seeking new homes in Canada, and it is to that section, the report says, that the United States should look for the development of existing and the creation of new markets of trade. The food, clothing and farming implements to which these settlers have been accustomed in the United States constitute the products which may be sold to them the easiest in Canada.

The report states that by the controlling body of public opinion in Canada the policy known as fiscal imperialism is regarded as impossible. Nevertheless manufacturers in the United States are warned that in the proposed revision of the Canadian tariff they may expect a further effort to discriminate in favor of goods from Great Britain. The growing markets of the future are declared to be in the Northwest.

For Mitchell and Representatives Hermann and Williamson actually come to Washington some time during the session of the 59th Congress and present themselves in person to the sergeants-at-arms, respectively, of the Senate and House, they will not receive the mileage to which all Senators and Representatives are entitled. In the case of the Oregon men, this mileage amounts to \$1250 or more, being computed at the rate of 20 cents a mile from their homes to Washington and return. This allowance is made each session, but mileage is not paid unless Senators and Representatives actually make the journey to Washington.

Because of this fact it is believed that Mitchell and Hermann will come to Washington some time this winter. Mitchell intends to come East, so it is said, to consult with his attorney before his case is tried in the Supreme Court, and it is thought Hermann will come and attempt to take his seat in the House. Nothing has been learned as to Williamson's intentions, but unless he comes to Washington he must surrender his mileage.

Active Montana Sheep Market.

Activity in the sheep business has never been so general in the northern part of Montana as during the past few months, and conservative stockmen, who are engaged in the purchase and disposal of sheep, are authority for the statement that at least one million head have been shipped out of Cascade, Teton, Chouteau, Valley and Fergus counties.

William Rea, of the well-known firm of Rea Bros., which has developed into one of the most extensive sheep-buying concerns in this country, says about everything is now out of first hands in the Northwest, or right ready to send to market, but that shipments will be made during the balance of November. "We have bought 470,000 head of sheep during the last year," said Mr. Rea, "and shipped more than 250,000 head of these to the Chicago market and resold some of our stock bought on contract." Fewer sheep will be fed in Montana this winter than in recent years, owing to the high cost of the sheep as feeders and the fact that alfalfa has been sold largely to ranchers to winter through big bands of lambs. There will be very little feeding in the region of Billings, where so much has been done heretofore.
