Treasurer—L. W. Briggs, 187. The new officers will take the oath of office at the next regular meeting.

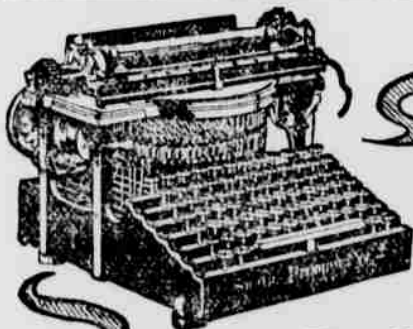
